TO BE NO FURTHER GOVERNMENT LOANS

INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE STRONGLY DISAPPROVED BY SECRETARY CLASS.

DOOMED TO DISAPPOINTMENT

Credits Required for the Economic Restoration of Europe Must Come Through Private Channels.

Washington.—The United States treasury does not look with favor upon certain features of the proposed international conference recently called by a coterie of nationally known financiers and commercial leaders in an effort to lead the world out of the financial and commercial chaos into which it was dragged by the war.

Secretary Glass declared in a letter to a committee of the chamber of commerce of the United States, which has sought a government expression on the meeting, that such a conference would serve "to cause confusion and revive hopes, doomed to disappointment, of further government loans."

With a note of some finality, Mr. Glass set forth the government's policy with respect to furnishing credits, stating that the treasury "is opposed to government control over foreign trade and finance and even more opposed to private control. It is convinced that the credits required for the economic restoration must come through private channels." In this respect, this government fears the proposed conference would mean many Europeans would assume that the United States was about to shoulder more of their burdens, Mr. Glass explained.

REPRESENTATIVE SMALL DOES NOT LIKE THE PLUMB PLAN.

Washington.—Representative John H. Small of North Carolina charged that the farmer and some of his organizations are being used to further the Plumb plan for the government control of the railroads and for the crippling of the farm loan act.

"I believe that the people of North Carolina think that the railroads should be returned to their owners as soon as legislation for that purpose can be passed," said Mr. Small. "My information as to the effect that the farmers of the country entertain this view."

"It is my opinion that the railroads should be returned and that we should enact legislation which will restore their credit as far as possible and enable them to serve the public."

CHICAGO SALOON KEEPERS LEAVE THAT CITY FOR CUBA.

Chicago.—Departing at the rate of 300 a day, former Chicago saloon keepers and bar tenders are going to Cuba, according to Joseph Popper, internal revenue deputy collector.

WASHINGTON'S GREAT NEPHEW DIED OF FLU AT WASHINGTON.

Washington.—Lawrence Washington, great nephew of George Washington, died of influenza here. He was born at Mount Vernon in 1855 and for the last 25 years had been employed at the library of congress.

200 PER CENT INCREASE IN SOME FOODS, IS SHOWN.

Washington.—Increases of from 50 to 200 per cent in retail prices of the principal food products of the country and from 70 to more than 200 per cent in wholesale during the last six years, are shown in figures issued by bureau of labor statistics.

Wholesale clothing prices, according to the bureau's figures, showed an increase of 235 per cent last December over 1913 levels and house furnishings went up 203 per cent.

BAKER ASKS GOVERNORS TO AID IN RECRUITING DRIVE.

Washington.—Secretary Baker has addressed a letter to the governor of each state requesting his official cooperation in the nationwide recruiting drive to be inaugurated by the war department and to be intensified during the week of February 22 to 29, which is to be made national enlistment week. The governors were asked to issue proclamations calling the attention of their citizens to the importance of the advantages offered.

3,000 CHINESE COOLIES ARE HELD PENDING EXAMINATION.

Halifax, N. S.—Three thousand Chinese coolies bound home from France are being held on board the steamer Minnekahda here until the military authorities and the chief health officer of the port settle their dispute as to whether the illness of some of them is influenza or colds. A train load which started for the west a day or so ago, was brought back when it was found that two coolies had high fever.

SOUTH CAROLINIAN ON ADMIRAL SIMS

DESERVING OF CONDEMNATION FOR LIBELLING THE ARMY AND BELITTLING NAVY.

'A HYPHENATED POLITICIAN'

"For False Statements and Slanders He Should be Required to Answer to the American Doughboy."

Washington.—Rear Admiral Sims, a leading figure in the naval decorations controversy and in the pending senate investigation of the navy's conduct of the war, was vigorously attacked in the house of representatives by Representative Byrnes, South Carolina.

Declaring that if the admiral was admonished by a high naval official not to let the British "pull the wool" over his eyes as he testified recently, he violated a confidence in making the instructions public, Representative Byrnes said he deserved the "condemnation of every American and dishonorable discharge from the navy."

Characterizing Sims as a "hyphenated politician," Mr. Byrnes charged that when serving as commander of the American naval forces in European waters during the war, he had "libelled the army and depreciated the work of the navy," and had urged that the United States leave the control of the seas to Great Britain.

"While in Paris, on October 30, 1918," said Mr. Byrnes, "Admiral Sims told Representatives Glass, of Virginia; Whaley, of South Carolina, and myself, that the armistice asked for by the enemy would have to be granted, because of the failure of Pershing to break through the German ranks, due to the disastrous breakdown in transportation behind the American lines. We visited the headquarters of the Service of Supply and found that only a few days previously Pershing had written the S. O. S. congratulating them on their wonderful work in supplying the forces in the field. His statement was false and for his inexcusable slander he should be made to answer to the American doughboy."

MEREDITH ACCEPTS POSITION OF SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE

Washington.—Edwin T. Meredith of Iowa, editor of "Successful Farming" will be named secretary of agriculture to succeed Secretary Houston, who is to become secretary of the treasury in the place of Carter Glass. Mr. Meredith, who is at Miami, Fla., telegraphed the white house accepting the office. He is 54 years old and his home is in Des Moines.

375,000 OF 500,000 MEN PERISH, REPORTS STATE

Geneva.—Nearly 375,000 of the 500,000 Austro-Hungarian prisoners of war taken by Russians have perished in Siberia from smallpox and typhus, according to Vladivostok dispatches to International Red Cross headquarters here.

COUNT HOHENZOLLERN IS ABSOLUTELY DISCOURAGED

Mayence.—German newspapers publish a letter from former Emperor William to a personal friend in which Count Hohenzollern expresses his absolute discouragement and says he does not want ever to return to Germany. He says he believes his return would cause a split between German factions.

14,805 CASES FLU REPORTED IN THE STATE OF ILLINOIS

Washington.—Influenza continues to spread over the country. Reports to the public health service said the total of cases reported in Illinois had reached 14,805 and that this probably included only about one-fifth of the actual number.

INDUSTRIAL TROUBLES OF SPAIN HAVE NOT ABATED

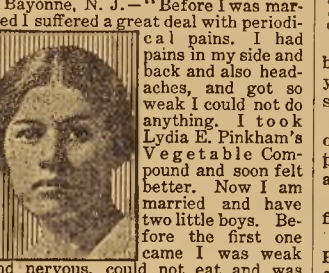
Madrid.—Although the lockouts at Barcelona and in this city have been declared at an end, the industrial troubles of Spain continue, the large majority of workmen refusing to resume their posts, claiming there has been no improvement in conditions of labor. In this city the situation has come more threatening because strikers have been trying to induce men not to return to work.

NO ACTION IS YET TAKEN ON COMPULSORY TRAINING BILL

Washington.—Although Chairman Wadsworth announced he probably would report the measure because other matters are pending it was not believed the new army reorganization bill ordered favorably reported would be called up in the senate before next week. The bill, designed to create a permanent military policy, provides for compulsory military training for boys between the ages of 18 and 21, inclusive.
