Soviet Propaganda in the United States Senate

SENATOR WILLIAM E. BORAH, who is publicly recognized by the Russian Belshevists or Communists as a leading friend of the pro-Soviet propaganda in this country, opened the newest campaign in the United States Senate, preliminary to the hearings now under way, with a speech in support of Soviet recognition.

In this speech Borah shows himself antagonistic to the position of the American Federation of Labor at every point. Parallel columns will demonstrate.

The quotations are from Borah's speech of January 7 and from the last A. F. of L. convention resolution on the subject (1922).

BORAH.
