The following conclusions have been reached by the Children's Bureau of the United States Department of Labor:

"There were, in 1921, in the whole of the United States, 2,625,208-births, and 1,264,182 deaths (under

one year of age).
"Low mortality rates found among the babies of foreignborn Jewish mothers, and in families of the highest earnings groups.

"Employment of the mother away from home in the pre-natal period (chiefly in factory work) was accompanied by a high percentage of premature births and high infant mortality, especially from the causes peculiar to early infancy. "Employment of mothers away

from home during the first year of color, solid red-tan; two years old; their babies lives also markedly increased the hazard to the baby. "Room congestion and lack of sanitary equipment in the house were accompanied by death rates

above the average. "In the poorest families studied about one baby in six died within the year; in the most prosperous families about one baby in 26 died within the year."

Assuming that the most prosperous families constitute 30 per cent of the people of the United States; and the poorer families 70 per cent, and the death rate of the prosper ous is one in 26, or about one-fourth that of the poorer families; we must admit that three-fourths of 70 per cent, or 608,534 babies died in 1921 because the families' income was not sufficient to provide for them prop-


