LIBRARIES USED **TO DEFEAT LABOR**

Atlantic City, N. J., Aug. 14 .-Great foundations, including the Carnegie Foundation, are bitterly assailed in a report made today by the Librarians' Union to the American Federation of Labor. The report was referred to the standing committee on education composed of George W. Perkins, Matthew Woll, John P. Frey and Charles Baine. This committee was instructed to investigate the charges found in the report and to bring in a set of findings for final action.

The charges are, briefly:

1. That Carnegie libraries are not controlled by the municipalities in which they exist and to which they have been given.




