FROM NORTH GEORGIA.

MARIETTA, June 27.
Nothing of interest is transpiring here. Both armies are occupying the same positions they have held for some days. Our batteries on Kenesaw Mountain are shelling the enemy's works this morning. Their batteries are replying, wasting much gunpowder.

Secretary Memminger's Successor.
It is said, says the Mason (Ga.) Confederate, that Mr. FARMAN, President of one of the Charleston Banks, has been appointed Secretary of the Treasury vice MEMMINGER, resigned.

THE REMOVAL OF BRITISH CONSULS FROM THE CONFEDERATE STATES.
The official correspondence respecting the removal of British Consuls from the Confederate States, was presented to the House of Lords on the 10th ult. The letters, which, irrespective of enclosures, are twelve in number, range in date from June 9 to November 20, 1863. They refer to the removal of Mr. Moore from Richmond, Mr. Criland from Mobile, Mr. Walker from Charleston, and Mr. Fullerton from Savannah. The correspondence was moved for on April 5th last. A return moved for at the same time of all copies or extracts of all correspondence with any agents of the Confederate States in this country, was also presented to the House of Lords the same day. It consists of letters exchanged between Earl Russell and Mason, and extending from March 24 to October 6th, 1863.
