THE DAILY CAUCASIAN WILL SUFFER.
 The first issue of THE DAILY CAUCASIAN appeared January 6th, just prior to the assembling of the legislature. That issue contained the following announcement:

"We start THE DAILY CAUCASIAN at this time, to report the proceedings of the legislature to our people, and to defend ourselves against the misrepresentations which our enemies are sure to attempt to sow broadcast to the danger and damage of the reform movement in North Carolina. As yet, the stockholders have not determined as to whether or not the paper shall be continued as a daily beyond the present session of the legislature. It is hoped and believed that our people will rally to the support of the paper as to enable it to continue its much needed work of educating the public conscience along the lines of necessary reform. But if it shall be so that our expectations and wishes in this regard are disappointed, we can confidently assure all the people that THE DAILY CAUCASIAN will be in the fight in 1896."

The chief purpose for which the Daily issue of the paper was begun is now accomplished. It has reported the proceedings of the legislature, and has tried to be honest and fair. If there has ever been a misrepresentation of anything or anybody, it has been purely accidental. Some criticisms have been offered and some positions have been taken which apparently did not please some who might, for political reasons only, have been regarded as its friends. But the positions assumed and the criticisms offered have been honest; and if they were afterwards discovered to be erroneous, there was never any hesitation in admitting error.

There has been no disappointment in the hope and belief that our people would rally to the support of the Daily. A wide conference, by correspondence and otherwise, has been had as to the advisability of continuing the publication of THE DAILY CAUCASIAN. This conference was with the three thousand subscribers that went on the books within three weeks after the Daily issue was begun, and also with other friends all over the State; and there are at hand sufficient pledges for subscriptions and stock to justify a continuance of the Daily publication. But with these pledges there is a strongly expressed judgment that an absolute necessity for its continuance does not exist just now, but will exist in the future. Acting on that judgment, the directors of THE CAUCASIAN Publishing Company have decided that the Daily issue shall be suspended with the ending of the session of the legislature. The Daily issue of Thursday morning, March 14, will therefore be the last one for the present. It will be reissued at the proper time. It may not be amiss to say that the Daily issue ceases with money in its treasury, and with paid up stock subscriptions practically unimpaired. Proper disposition will be made of the funds which have been paid for subscriptions for a longer time than the Daily has been published.

FOR UNITED ACTION.
 From the CAUCASIAN'S point of view, nothing can be said against the movement recently begun for the purpose of uniting into one organization, regardless of avowed political faith, all the people of the country who honestly desire a settlement of the financial question by the adoption of free coinage of silver at the rate of 16 to 1.

The movement which the CAUCASIAN would be slow to criticize is the one which has recently resulted from the honest and persistent work of the American Bi-Metallic League, and which has to a very considerable extent already united a large number of prominent people of previously existing different political faiths, who have formally declared their intention of putting the financial issue ahead of everything else and forcing it to a conclusion.

The basis of this movement is expressed as follows:
 The money question is now indisputably the dominant issue in the United States, and will remain so until settled and settled rightly. Other questions, however important, must wait for this, which to a great or less extent, involves all others. The issue is between the gold standard, gold bonds, and bank currency on the one side, and the bimetallic standard, no bonds, and government currency on the other.
 First, On this issue we declare ourselves to be unalterably opposed to the single gold standard, and demand the immediate return to the constitutional standard of gold and silver by the restoration by this Government, independently of any foreign power, of the unrestricted coinage of both silver and gold into standard money at a ratio of 16 to 1, and upon terms of exact equality, the silver coin to be a full legal tender, equally with gold, for all debts and dues, public and private.
 Second, We hold that the power to control and regulate a paper currency is inseparable from the power to coin money, and hence that all currency intended to circulate as money should be issued under the control and under the authority of the general government only, and should be legal tender.
 Third, We are unalterably opposed to the issue by the United States of interest-bearing bonds in time of peace, and demand the payment of all coin obligations of the United States, as provided by existing laws, in either gold or silver coin, at the option of the Government, and not at the option of the creditor.
 In this issue we appeal from the intelligence and patriotism of the American people.

We would like to ask what the News and Observer meant by saying that "the sixty day limit for the legislature has expired, and yet the tax payers are still burdened to give the Reformers more time to caucus." Honest now, what did you mean? Every sensible man knows what impression you attempt to create; but will you tell, square out, what you tried to insinuate? Was it a few clerks' pay, or did you want to deceive some of the remainder of your poor, blind, prejudiced and discredited old Democratic party into believing that the legislature was taking the State's money for overtime? You ought to have been on guard like this when the people were burdened to pay you some thousands annually for nothing.

COULD CALL A REVOLUTION
 But Will let Congress Investigate And Take Conservative Action.
 NASHVILLE, Tenn., March 11.—A special to the Banner from Montgomery, Ala., says Captain Kolb, who claims to be Alabama's rightful governor, left Montgomery today for Birmingham to be present at the meeting of the State executive committee tomorrow called for the purpose of determining whether the party shall adopt revolutionary methods to seat Kolb. Capt. Kolb declined to talk, saying: "I have written a strong communication to the committee which will be given to the press."

It is understood here that Kolb favors revolutionary methods. It is said the committee will be about evenly divided on Kolb's proposition. Hon. J. C. Manning, president of the Southern Populist League and Populist leader of Alabama, passed through Nashville yesterday en route east. Referring to the Populist State committee meeting to assemble in Birmingham, he was led to say that nothing in that line would be done. He said: "Kolb has been twice Governor, but although the Alabama legislature refused to allow him a contest in law and has deprived him of his seat, he is greater than governors, in the knowledge that he has led a movement in Alabama which is slowly, steadily and surely destroying a corrupt government. He could cause a revolution now and get followers to march on the capitol, but we will let Congress march on Oates and his band of law breakers, and we want public sentiment and outraged justice to rise and bury him and his cohorts. The opposition to us are the Anarchists. We are the conservatives of peace and the party attempting to uphold justice. The executive committee will do nothing radical or revolutionary."

ARTICLES OF AGREEMENT.
 We the undersigned do hereby agree to the terms of engaging in the business hereinafter set forth and described, do hereby enter into articles of agreement for that purpose pursuant to chapter 16, of the Code of North Carolina, entitled "Corporations," and the Acts of the General Assembly of North Carolina amendatory thereof, that is to say:
 I. The Corporation name shall be "CAUCASIAN Publishing Company."
 II. The business proposed shall be the publication of one or more newspapers, conducting the business of job printing and binding and carrying on such other business as is usually done by printing and publishing companies.
 III. The place where said business is proposed to be carried on is Raleigh, Wake county, N. C., and such other place or places for branch offices as the Board of Directors may determine.
 IV. The length of time desired for the existence of said corporation is thirty years from and after the date of these articles next ensuing.
 V. The names of the persons who have subscribed for stock in said Corporation are as follows, to-wit: Marion Butler, of Raleigh, N. C.; William F. Stroud, of Wake county, N. C.; W. A. Guthrie, of Durham, N. C.; W. H. Worth, of Raleigh, N. C.; J. C. L. Harris, of Raleigh, N. C.; A. C. Shuford, of Newton, N. C.
 VI. The amount of the capital stock of said corporation shall be \$20,000, divided into two thousand shares of the par value of ten dollars each, such appraisal valuation as may be agreed on between the Board of Directors and such subscriber.
 VII. The Corporators, subscribers for stock, and stockholders of said Corporation, shall not be individually or personally responsible or liable for the debts, contracts, pecuniary obligations, engagements or torts of said Corporation.
