H. S. Nunn, the editor of the New Berne Journal, died at his residence on last Sunday evening.

Gov. Fowle has appointed M. B. F. Boykin, of Clinton, N. C., Director of the Insane Asylum vice T. B. Womack resigned.

The third annual Convention of the Sabbath School Association will be held in Wilmington, N. C., on February 25th, 26th and 27th, instead of 9th, 10th and 11th of April, as previously announced.

Mr. W. L. Douglas, of Brocton, Mass., who is the maker of the famous \$3.00 shoe, advertised in this paper, and whose picture appears in the advertisement, has been elected Mayor of his town.

Bills for the admission of Wyoming and for the organization of a territorial form of government in Oklahoma were reported favorably in Congress this week by the committee on Territories, and early action has been asked on them.

The Legislature of South Carolina has passed a law requiring cotton to be sold at net weight and making the tare sixteen pounds when covered with cotton bagging and twenty-four pounds when covered with jute, six hoops. The law goes into effect September 1st, 1890.

A terrible snow storm is reported up Northwest. The Central & Northern Pacific railroad is snow bound, where it crosses the Sierra Mountains. The telegraph lines are down and the men can't repair them till the trains get to running. So for the time all direct communication with Washington and Oregon is cut off.

It begins to look as if the proposed World's Fair of 1892 will not be anywhere. The fight among the places contending for it is so bitter that Congress has gotten into a muddle over the matter and probably will do nothing. Each dog wants the bone, but had rather see it spoiled than let another have it.

The Supreme Court has granted ex-Priest Boyle a new trial, holding that there was an error, in this, that the judge omitted to state certain portions of the testimony and the law applicable to it distinctly to the jury, when asked by the defendant's counsel; from which omission it reasonably appears that defendant's case did not go before the jury as correctly or in as favorable a light as he had a right to ask.—News and Observer.

The Chief Justice of the Fifth District sent his resignation to Gov. Fowle last Tuesday week. On Thursday the Governor appointed T. B. Womack, of Chatham, to fill the vacancy. Mr.—now Judge Womack is a young man, has served in the Legislature and was chief clerk of the House last session. Hon. John Manning, of Chapel Hill, wrote Governor Fowle recommending Womack as follows:

"While Mr. Womack is too young a man to be pronounced a learned lawyer, he is a young man of great ability, quick to apprehend a legal point, of a discriminating character of mind, great aptitude for business, and of studious habits. His personal character is excellent, and I feel sure that if you should appoint him to the vacant Judgeship, there will not disappoint your reasonable expectations. He read law in my office and I know him."

THE COUNTY LECTURER Delivers a Public Address at New Hope Academy.

The address of Mr. Marion Butler at New Hope Academy, by invitation of New Hope Alliance, last Saturday, was a rare treat to those who heard him. His attack upon trusts, editors and combines was greatly enjoyed by all. He first discussed the present banking system, management and ownership of the railroads, telegraph lines and the question of aliens holding property, showing by the way he handled them that he was master of his subject. He told the farmers that they must learn to think for themselves, not rush out to meet the enemy, like Gracchi, and with staves only,—that the contest must be won or lost amid the clash of intellects.

His logical arguments on the tariff were grand. He says the protection now granted to the "infant" industries is nearly five times as great as the protection accorded to the same industries in the younger days of the Republic, and yet they seem to be even more in need of it than ever (if they are to be believed). He drew a striking contrast between the protected manufacturers of New England and the unprotected farmers of the South. Unjust legislation tells the story. The Government is under control of plutocracy—money-kings who are driving the produce to starvation in the midst of plenty, by gambling on the hard earned products of his labor.

We would be glad to see Mr. Butler's speech published and put in the hands of every farmer in the South. It would put men to thinking, and soon they would act.
