Judge Boykin's physician in a conversation with the News and Observer yesterday said: Judge Boykin is still confined to his bed with malarial fever, and although his fever has somewhat abated and he is free from dangerous symptoms, he is too weak to resume his duties on the bench for the present, and court has been adjourned for this term on account of his illness.

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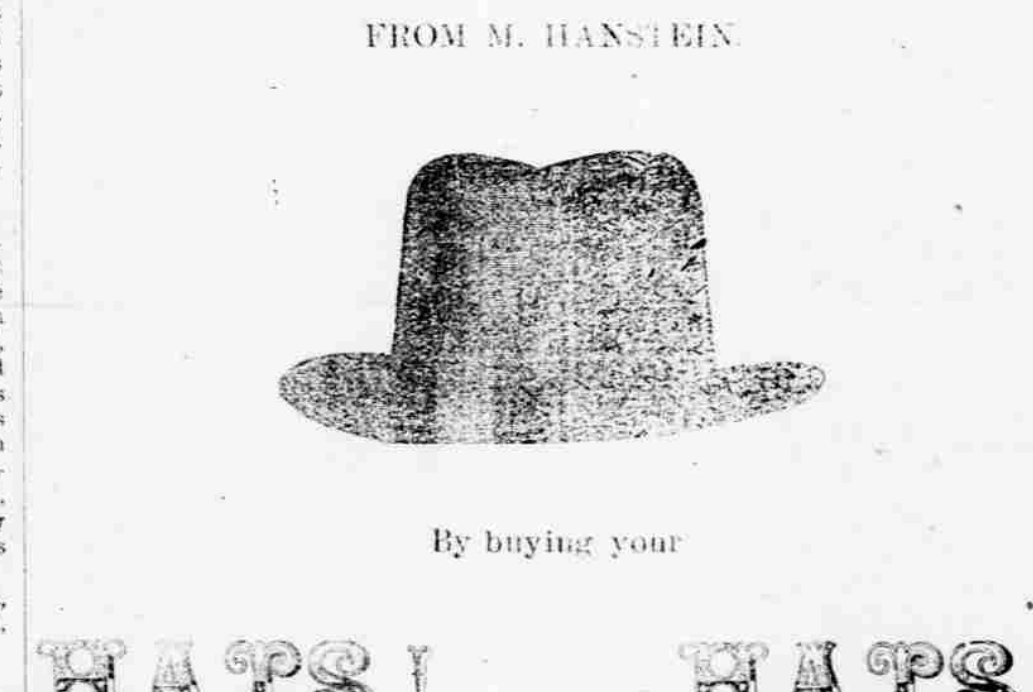
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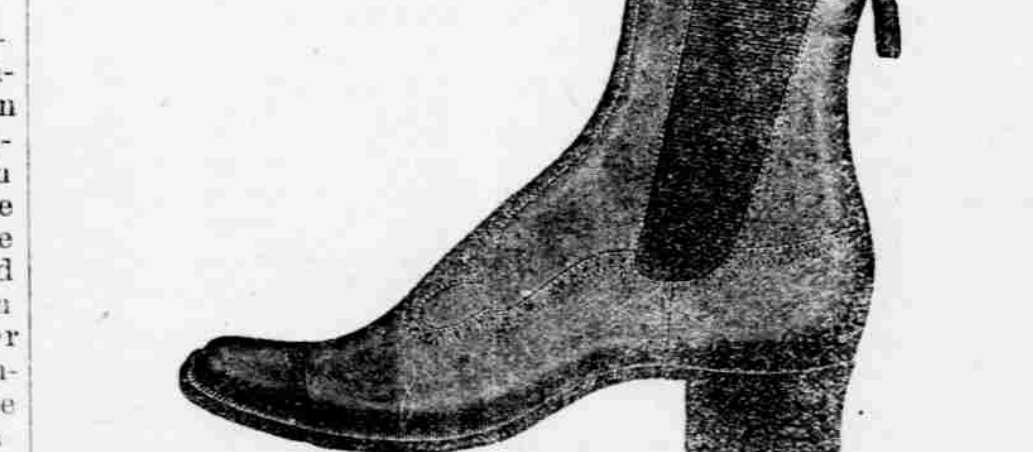
