wood, lumber, and a large number of articles. Since that conversion the tariff bill has passed, and the writer wishes to call the attention of the farmer to one article, at least, that it now has been on the free list for four years—hides of all kinds, except sheep skins with the wool on, has been on the free list, and the wool, has been free from the 1st day of October, 1892. From the 2nd day of March, 1891, to the 2nd day of October, 1892, all hides paid a duty of 50 cents per pound. A farmer could carry a hide to market and buy with it three pairs of shoes for his family. Since they have been on the free list it takes four large sized hides to buy one pair of shoes.

The tariff bill of 1861 put wool on the duty list, and from that day to the present time the wool industry has been immensely benefited. The wool from the United States sold for over \$130,000,000 in one year. The sheep owners paid \$2,000,000 for labor. Under this free wool the industry must go to ruin.

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## Ransom Loots the Campaign Committee.

This is the first time since 1870 that the Democratic majority has fallen below 50,000. It has ranged from 60,000 to 70,000. The most startling feature of the election, however, is the development of the fact that several Congressional districts show clear Populist majorities which may smash the solid Democratic delegation in November next. In the First, Second and Eleventh and Eighteenth Districts, where the Populists were hardly organized and where they did not run legislative tickets, the Democratic majorities of two years ago were reduced 50 per cent. The Tenth, Tom Watson's own district, gives a clean Populist majority. The Fourth, now represented by Charles J. Moss, is Populist also, and returns coming in from the Seventh indicate that that district will be likewise. Carter Tate's district, the Ninth, only missed being Populist by seven votes.

WHOLLY UNEXPECTED. This news is a big surprise in Washington and Senator Ransom's visit here yesterday is more than a coincidence. The Georgia result increases the demand for election "boodie" in all the doubtful southern districts. This is a dazed look-alike campaign headquarters today.

"Where in the devil the money is to come from nobody can tell," said chairman Faulkner. Who, replied Lawyer G. A. Jones, "the money is to come from the pockets of the citizens. The committee is in a desperate and threatened with destruction. How much 'soap' Senator Ransom carried off is not known outside, but Haveney Barnes says it will last a little while—if not longer." It is the province of the committee to save Ransom at all expense and without regard to the loss of Democratic Congressmen. It is now conceded that the Democrats will

WILL LOSE THE NEXT HOUSE. And the loss of two or three Congressmen in North Carolina is not disturbing the "neavely-twin" combination here. "Save the Legislature and save Ransom" is the slogan at headquarters. The Maine and Vermont State elections and the Connecticut town elections last week indicate a solid New England Republican representation in the next Congress. The Connecticut election was particularly significant. The Republican gains were enormous, and Democratic strongholds giving majorities that have not been equaled since the war. The same causes are at work elsewhere and they will bring about overwhelming defeat to the Democratic party in November that American history will be searched in vain for a parallel.

and on his flank. Yet a majority of the Democrats, at heart, are with him. In Haywood county, where he spoke today, his information is that he is a 100 stronger than Ransom. But the Legislative candidates in the county are Ransom men. RANSOM WITHDRAWAL. It seems that Senator Jarvis was not entirely unprepared for this sort of opposition. He was advised of it, but accepted the reports as exaggerations. At Salisbury he was the guest of Mr. Lee S. Overman—a Western candidate for the Senate. At Statesville where Judge Anfield is also a candidate there was a show of approval. At Lenoir his audience was small, and imposed mainly of Republicans and Populists. At Asheville he was badly treated with common decency until the whispered possibility of his withdrawal from the fight became a street rumor.

ITS EMINATION. It is difficult to discover, at revenue headquarters, a common political opinion, information was given out in words and winks and nudges. One of the revenue editors said the Eastern managers would not be surprised at some announcement of that sort very soon. "There is nothing definite," he said, "and we are not in a position to talk about it. It may be so and may not be so. By this time Senator Jarvis must see that the sentiment in the West is solid for Ransom." It was then suggested that the
