LECTION METHODS IN NORTH CAROLINA. VIRGINIA AND ALABAMA. The House Committee which has had under consideration the case of R. T. Thorpe, contestant against Sidney P. Thompson of the Fourth Virginia Congressional District has finished its report.

No question is raised as to the decision of the court on the matter as it came before that body; but it is reasonable to suppose that if such facts as are shown in the article printed elsewhere had accompanied the case when it was reviewed, there would have been a different decision.

As a matter of public importance, it would be interesting to know if there are many other cases in which dead men have been summoned in this matter, and how many more cases there are in which summons have never been served.

THE SPANISH MINISTER AND PRESIDENT MCKINLEY. Last week the Administration at Washington, and, indeed, the whole country, was shocked by the publication of a private letter written by the Spanish Minister at Washington to the editor of the Herald, a Spanish paper, the organ of the Administration at Madrid.

It is not the part of the letter that contains the greatest sensation. It is a paragraph that reflects upon President McKinley and is in the following language: "Besides the natural and inevitable coarseness with which he repeats all that the press and public opinion of Spain has to say of you, it shows once more that McKinley is weak and catering to the rabble, and, besides, a low politician, who desires to leave a door open to me and to stand well with the jingoes of his party."

Such language is not only an insult to the President but it is an insult to the whole nation. But the greatest humiliation to our country is not from the fact that such language was used by the Spanish minister as put himself in a position to make such language about him and the Administration possible.

But we regret exceedingly to state that the Republicans, who had been cheated by the Democrats for a quarter of a century, in the Legislature of 1897 joined with the Democrats and the bolting Populists to strike this provision out of the election of this State and return to the old ballot-box stuffing methods of the Democratic machine.

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It is a positive fact that the claim in question was created by Democratic office-holders and is being pushed by lawyers who are thought to be prominent Democrats, and conclusions may be drawn by the public according to its ability for passing upon facts.

A demand was made on the present Auditor for the amount, who, admitting the liability of the State under the decision of the court, held that he was unable to find any existing statute law which would justify him in issuing the warrants, and that he could only report the matter to the General Assembly for adjustment.

The Kentucky Legislature recently passed a resolution requesting Senator Lindsay to resign. The Senator who is one of the victims of the Cleveland "regime," in his reply called attention to the fact that he had elected him since he voted to repeal the purchasing clause of the Sherman act.

It is in no position to criticize Senator Lindsay, for when he was elected under the influence of Cleveland, Mr. Daniels went under the influence of Hoke Smith. While Lindsay was voting to repeal the last silver law on the statute book, editor Daniels, who was holding a job (pie if you please) under Hoke Smith, was writing letters to his paper advocating and supporting the course pursued by Lindsay and Ransom.

In 1876 the Legislature of Wisconsin adopted a resolution similar to that of Kentucky, calling on Senator Doolittle, of that State, to quit. The Legislature was spurred to that action because Doolittle had voted against the submission to the State of the fifteenth amendment to the Constitution of the United States. He paid no attention to it.

Lewis Cass of Michigan, got into hot water with his State. He opposed in the Senate the Wilnot proviso in spite of the instructions of his Legislature which directed him to favor it. He said that in a direct conflict between his duty and his principles he would resign his seat. In opposing the Wilnot proviso he held that no conflict had arisen between his duty and his principles and so did not resign. He retained his seat until 1848, when, being nominated for the Presidency by his party and being defeated, he was re-elected by his Legislature to serve his own term out.

The celebrated Henry Winter Davis was made to feel the vengeance of his State in a somewhat similar manner. He was elected to the Thirty-sixth Congress as a Know Nothing. A long struggle ensued over the election of a Speaker, John Sherman being the Republican. Finally the struggle was ended by the choice of Mr. Pennington of New Jersey. Mr. Davis voted for him and for so doing was, as he expressed it on the floor of the House "decorated with censure by the Maryland Legislature." He was a plucky man and declared to his constituents that if they would not allow their representative to exercise his own judgment as to what was the best interests of the State, "that you may send a slave to Congress, but you cannot send me."

Concerning the "Famlico Oyster Cases" about which something is said in this issue, we wish to observe that more than one Democratic machine journal has admitted so-called "editorial" and anonymous communications to their columns denouncing the State Treasurer for refusing to pay the warrants drawn by a Democratic Auditor. These "editorials," etc., were nothing less than the whine of certain lawyers, who are machine Democrats, because they were barred from the public crib from which they were so long accustomed to feed.

We are compelled to appreciate the effort of the Greensboro Telegram to be "smart." Doubtless his papa told him when he was a little boy, he must be smart, and it gratifies him to note the heroic attempt by filial obedience. The effort is praiseworthy, and if he keeps trying, with the capacity he manifests now, he may be successful in twenty years.

Curious isn't it, to see the Dem machine calling on all goldbug Dems and every other sort of Dem to stand together to win State office, and then abuse others for uniting to keep this Dem machine from completing the ruin of the State.

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He shows that every effort of his to advance the principles of the party or to bring about harmony was opposed. He was convinced that the purpose of these men is to divide and disrupt the party. He closes his editorial as follows: "That there are evil influences at work upon the Committee we are sure. The image of Kaute Nelson was plainly seen by us in Dr. Johnson's eyes. It was too distinct to be mistaken, and yet we hope the Doctor will overcome the influence and put himself on record as a harmonizer instead of a disrupter. The future will reveal his true condition. Whatever he or others may do, shun the cunning and dishonesty of Shylock and his hirelings."

FINDING IT ALL OUT. Five years ago, say many in the South country who attempted to warn the people against the money power and the encroachments of corporations was pretty general regarded as a mild sort of lunatic. Now the Democratic Machine Journalism of this State is the only thing that has the impudence to condemn and denounce such a man. But the people and some officials are finding it all out. An exchange says: "An eminent judge of our highest State court, was recently heard to say that the greatest danger to this country is the ever increasing power and arrogance of the great moneyed corporations. He is right. By the exercise of immense power with the money gives them they have almost universally controlled legislation, they have dictated the appointment of almost all Federal Judges and, in some States, of the State judiciary as well. By means of combinations and trusts they control the prices of a great number of the articles of prime necessity to the people. By manipulations very much like common law they gobble up all of our lines of transportation and then oppress the people by extortionate rates. They pay their contractors for such supplies as cross-ties when they please, and settle claims against them for the cost of legal fees and property destroyed only when forced to do so by the courts. They furnish money to corrupt the elections and try by all manner of bribery and intimidation to control Legislatures and Congresses. How to deal with them is one of the big questions of the future."

HERE IT IS AGAIN. If there is anything in evidence, the goldbug machine is still bossing the Democratic party. In the campaigns of 1897, where they were held, the record was something like this: In Massachusetts, for free silver. In New York, for nothing; but the nominee was a goldbug. In the city campaign of Greater New York, the Chicago platform was absolutely ignored and abandoned, so-called free-silver machine Democrats helped Tammany Hall to win. In Maryland, for gold. In Pennsylvania, for free silver, though goldbugs were nominated everywhere.

And so it will be this year. And in 1900 the goldbug machine will have full control of the Democratic party. Watch the prediction. Telegraph dispatches state Mr. J. Bryan, Marion Butler and others have gone west to consult with reference to a uniting of all the financial reform forces for the coming campaign. So Bryan and Butler consult together. Bryan thinks Butler very worthy of such consultation, and Butler believes Bryan to be honest enough to trust. They can unite for reform. The Democratic machine journalism down here can out whoop a whip-poor-will for Bryan and can out-smell a pole-cat in their party about the issue of Butler. We just think the people to analyze such facts as these, so that they may see what a slobbering fraud and contemptible hypocrite this Democratic machine journalism is.

Senator Chandler in an interview warns his Republican friends that if the next campaign is fought on the money question, the Republican party will be ingloriously defeated. He appeals to the Administration to take up a bold stand for Cuban independence and to inaugurate an American policy that will meet the approval of the people and call attention from the evils of the gold standard and monopoly rule. Speaking as a partisan Senator Chandler is very wise in this utterance; but if he would view the situation from the standpoint of patriotism why should not these reasons be sufficient to cause him to leave the party of trusts, combines, and gold?
