THE NEW BULL-PEN ELECTION LAW

The recent Legislature repealed the non-partisan election laws of 1895 and 1897, which guaranteed to every party the right to be represented on election boards by election officers of their own choosing.

The leading provisions of this law as published by the Raleigh News & Observer are as follows: 1. That the election for State and county officers shall be held on the first Thursday in August and every two years thereafter.

2. That there shall be a State board of elections composed of five persons elected by the Legislature for a term of two years.

3. That there shall be a county board of elections consisting of three persons, appointed by State board for a term of two years.

4. That the State Board of elections shall meet in Raleigh the first Monday in May, 1899, and organize by electing one of their number chairman and another secretary.

5. That the registration books shall be kept open to receive applications for registration, and for the year next preceding, and if any applicant shall falsely swear he has listed his poll for taxation, he shall be guilty of perjury and be punished as prescribed by law.

7. That before the next general election there shall be an entirely new registration. Among questions to be asked applicant is "whether he has listed his poll for taxation for the current year in which he applies for registration, and for the year next preceding, and if any applicant shall falsely swear he has listed his poll for taxation, he shall be guilty of perjury and be punished as prescribed by law.

9. That on or before the first Monday in July the county board shall appoint two judges of election for each precinct.

10. That to prevent disorder as many as possible special officers, as appointed by the registrars and judges of election.

11. That there shall be one ballot for all State officers, one for judges of different courts, one for members of General Assembly, one for township officers. That all ballots for each of these classes of officers shall be of the same size, on white paper and without device.
