CURRENT LOCAL NEWS.

Julius Hervey, the old soldier who wandered away from the Soldiers Home some days ago, has reappeared at the Home. He said he had been visiting his sister in Clinton.

The July term of the Wake Superior Court adjourned for the term Saturday afternoon. Tyson, who was indicted for bigamy and obtaining insurance money under false pretense, was sentenced to the penitentiary for ten years.

Mr. Larrie E. Nichols, of Raleigh, who served as sergeant in Company E, Forty-third United States Infantry, in the Philippines arrived home Friday. His regiment saw a exciting service and had in all three hundred men killed.

C. C. Wilbon, of West Durham, was killed on the track of the Southern railway between Cary and Morrisville Sunday morning about nine o'clock. He was lying on the track with his head on the rail when he was struck by the train. It is supposed he became tired and sat down by the track to rest and fell asleep. A flask containing whiskey was found on his person.

Two Children Drowned in a Small Creek Near Raleigh.

Two children were drowned in a small creek North of Raleigh Saturday afternoon. They were Bertha Emery, age 9 years and Willie Emery, age 6 years, the children of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Emery. They were crossing by a footlog when they fell into the river and were drowned. The bodies were found washed ashore a few hundred yards down the stream.

DAMAGING RAINS AT SOUTHERN PINES.

Seaboard Tracks Washed Out at Aberdeen—Fruit Damaged Considerably.

Southern Pines, N. C., July 16.—From 8 o'clock last night to 8 o'clock this morning eight inches of rain fell here. Lake Lauderdale dam was washed away, and the approaches to Piney Woods Inn are now one yawning gulf. The rush of water through Jimtown did great damage to stock and chickens. One horse in attempting to swim the swollen creek was drowned, and I. C. Edgeron, the owner saved himself by swinging to the bridge.

The streets of the town here are badly washed. All north bound trains are thirteen hours late. At Aberdeen the Seaboard Air Line tracks are washed out and no trains are able to pass. The Aberdeen and Rockfish railroad is badly washed. No trains have run for two days. Fruit was damaged considerably, but enough is left to realize good profits.

DISGUISED AS A WOMAN.

An Alleged Murderer Poses as a School-Marm.

Memphis, July 16.—A sensation has been caused at King's River, Madison county, Arkansas, by the arrest of Miss Jennie Sears, a young teacher who has been employed there for two years. Miss Sears has turned out to be a man in disguise. He committed murder in Texas several years ago, and since has been posing as a woman. Sears made a beautiful girl, and the people of Madison county were astounded by the revelation. Several of the young men of the county had gotten up a great rivalry on his account. When arrested he had \$3,000 in cash in his clothes. He will be taken to Texas at once.

Charbon's Death Rate.

Jackson, Miss., July 15.—During the first week or two of the charbon epidemic in the Delta, more than ninety per cent of the animals affected died, but since a supply of the virus for inoculation was prepared the death rate has been materially reduced. Unfortunately the disease is now spreading over all the country, not only in the Delta, but in the hills. Several cases were reported today in Rankin county, the adjoining county to this, and only a few miles north of Jackson.

Bridge Swept Away in Alamance Co.

Burlington, N. C., July 15.—The rains here Saturday were very severe. Three bridges over Stony Creek are gone. The dam at Sweptonville was broken. Haw river was over the bridge at Haw River station. All the low grounds were flooded, and the corn crop is very much damaged.

\$150,000 Fire in New Orleans.

New Orleans, July 16.—The Gardner Motor Works were struck by lightning last night and destroyed. The loss on the building, machinery and stock is about \$150,000. There had been a strike of machinists at the Gardner factory for over a month and Superintendent Gardner was recently beaten by strikers.

Prof. Holmes an Exposition Juror.

Buffalo, July 16.—The jury on miles and mining for the Pan American Exposition was named today. Prof. J. A. Holmes, State Geologist of North Carolina, is one of the five persons named.

37 Buildings Burned at Pinner's Point

Norfolk, July 17.—Fire broke out at Pinner's Point this Wednesday morning at 1 o'clock and destroyed 37 small dwellings, causing a loss of \$10,000 or \$15,000. No casualties are reported.

Increase of Pensioners.

Washington, July 16.—Despite the dropping of 38,082 names from the pension rolls through the death of that number of pensioners during the fiscal year ended June 30, there was a net increase of 4,305 names to the rolls by the granting of new pensions, and the number of names carried on the rolls June 30, was 997,834. There was an increase of 2,273 in the number of pensioners who died during the year as compared with the record of the previous fiscal year. The total expenditures on accounts of pensioners and administration was \$138,531,494, being an increase of \$69,338 over the disbursements of the previous year.

The number of claims filed with the Pension Bureau on account of disabilities incurred in the Spanish-American war up to June 30 aggregated 45,710, of which 7,086 were granted and 7,059 were rejected.

Non-Union Machinists Badly Beaten by Strikers.

Columbia, S. C., July 16.—Yesterday afternoon three of the non-union men who have taken the place in the Southern Railway machine shops made vacant by the strikers, were attacked while returning home by six men, three of whom were strikers. The names of the non-union men are Edgar Blain, J. X. Altman and E. X. Altman. The latter's brother, E. X. Altman is in bed and is thought to be badly hurt internally. He was felled to the ground by a brick bat and then kicked. The other two men were struck in the faces by their assailants and knocked down. Posses and warrants have been issued for the arrest of two of the attacking party, J. W. Wood and Tom Greene.
