CURRENT LOCAL NEWS.

Gov. Aycock's oldest son, who lives in Wilson, is very ill, and his friends have no hopes of recovery. Raleigh now has a bear at Pullen Park. The board of aldermen have appropriated \$100,000 for its maintenance for a year.

Brick laying for the textile school at the Agricultural and Mechanical College has begun. It is near the State Fair grounds.

Mr. Moore Parker, of Raleigh, has been appointed an instructor in the Textile School at the Agricultural and Mechanical College.

The Seaboard has abolished the post of baggage master on its through trains. His duty will be performed in the future by the express messenger.

Amanda Dunston, colored, who for many years kept a restaurant under the Market in this city, died last week leaving an estate valued at \$5,000, which she left to her grand-children.

"Improvements in the A. and M. College—splendid opportunities for farm boys to get a thorough education" is the title of a pamphlet that the Agricultural Department is now sending out.

Ex-Treasurer W. H. Worth, left Tuesday for High Point, where he goes to attend the meeting of the Society of Friends, which convened at that place Tuesday and will be in session all the week.

Mr. Olio Crocker, a young white man, was dragged by a telephone wire from the top of the Cape Fear railroad, near McCullers, Monday evening, and was seriously injured. He was taken to the home of Dr. McCullers, who dressed his wounds.

The Wake county pension board has passed on the pension list for this county, thus completing its work. They put 180 names on the list—105 soldiers and 74 widows. Just 120 applications were disapproved—115 soldiers and 5 widows.
