Rev. R. G. Pearson, the well known evangelist, last Sunday night commenced a ten-day revival services at the Presbyterian church in this city.

Thursday R. A. Hester, a white man in the county, was shot by a negro who mistook him for a negro with whom he was angry. The ball penetrated the skull but he will recover.

Mr. T. K. Bruner left Tuesday afternoon for Charleston to look after the arranging of the State's exhibit at the exposition. Another carload of the State's display will start today or to-morrow for Charleston.

Judge Simonton issued an order last week dismissing the receivership of Percival S. Hill, of the Blackwell-Durham Tobacco Company, when he shall have divided pro rata a balance of \$23,225 among the stockholders.

A fire started in the new residence of Mrs. Buman Friday night and entirely destroyed the building and two adjoining residences, the loss being estimated at \$2,500, fully insured. The origin of the fire is not known as no one was living in the house at the time the fire broke out. Incendiarism is suspected.

Governor Aycock on Saturday granted three pardons, one to J. S. Crumshaw of Mecklenburg county, who was serving a six months' sentence on the county roads for shooting and killing a watermelon thief and the other two to Charles H. McHagen and Jno. P. Mall. It was convicted in Edgecomb county of conspiracy to defraud creditors.

One of the oldest, if not the oldest, women in Wake county, Lucinda Long, colored, died at her home, 113 West Charlotte street, last week, at the ripe old age of 106 years. She was born in 1795, and remember well the war of 1812 and such other historic events which happened in the early century. She moved here from Granville county some time ago and had perfect vision and hearing up to the time of her death.

The veteran janitor of the capitol, Mr. F. M. Straghan, who has faithfully filled that position for the last thirty years, is lying critically ill at his home on Wilmington street. Mr. Straghan has been growing feeble for several months. To-day he was stricken with paralysis and fell. A little grandson, who was with him, at the time he fell, tried to help him up, but finding he could not do so, called for help. Mr. Straghan was carried into the house and medical aid summoned. The attack was not severe, but in his enfeebled condition it places him in a doubtful state.

The children burned to death. News reached this city Tuesday afternoon of a most distressing occurrence in Panther Branch township. It was the burning of a colored man's house in which thirteen helpless little children had been left alone and their charred remains were found among the debris and smoldering ruins.

The scene of the shocking catastrophe is near Myatt's mill, on Mr. W. M. Blalock's farm. Mack Blalock, a colored man, his wife and three children, occupied the house. Mack was absent working in the woods and his wife was away from home picking cotton, while their children, the oldest four years and the youngest eighteen months old, were left alone in the house. When the fire was discovered the house was completely filled with flames and there was no time for saving it. After the building was destroyed the roasted bodies of the three children were found in a spot where a bed had stood. It is supposed they were playing in the fire when the clothing of one or more of them caught and they sought refuge in the bed, or the building might have caught in some other way and in their fright being unable to get out of the house they ran to the bed.

**General News**

The Schley court of inquiry it is thought will strive to finish its work before congress convenes.

A train entering a South Carolina town the other day dislodged the pipe of a water tank, and the pipe broke the windows in a passenger car and deluged the passengers with water.

Rice lands in Texas two years ago were selling slowly at \$5 to \$15. Today such land is selling much faster at \$20 to \$50 per acre, and immigration to the rice belt is quite active.

Nearly 125,000 head of horses and mules have been purchased in the United States by Great Britain for her army since October, 1900. The cost of these animals was about \$16,000,000.

Colorado and Iowa have both reduced the death penalty for murder. There are now only four states in which the death penalty is not inflicted—Wisconsin, Michigan, Maine and Rhode Island.

A fast freight train on the Great Northern Railroad ran into a work train near Blair, Montana, Sunday, killing ten Japanese laborers and wounding 48. The wreck took fire, burning up ten cars.

The following named states and territories in 1900 did not contain any city with a population of 25,000 or more: Arizona, Idaho, Indian Territory, Mississippi, Nevada, New Mexico, North Carolina, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Vermont and Wyoming.

London, Nov. 18.—In the Old Bailey police court today Marie Josephine Eastwick, the young Philadelphia woman, was sentenced to six months imprisonment. Miss Eastwick was arrested in September on the charge of forging railway certificates to the value of \$100,000.

Great Increase in Post Office Receipts. In 1894 the gross receipts in the post office at Raleigh amounted to \$25,616.41, net revenue being \$12,137.94. In 1900 the gross receipts were \$45,149.41, the net revenue \$28,919.18. These figures without a word of comment show the great increase in business in Raleigh in five years, the net receipts now, exceeding the gross receipts of five years ago.

The latter figures include the receipts for the year ending June 30, 1901, and the cost of conducting the office is shown by the fact that in 1894 it took 62 per cent of the receipts while last year with greatly increased business the cost was 36 per cent of the receipts.

**Supreme Court Grants Permission**

To the State of South Dakota to Sue the State of North Carolina for the Collection of Second Mortgage Bonds Issued in Aid of the Construction of the Western North Carolina R. R. Special to the Caucasian. Washington, D. C., Nov. 16, 1901.—On last Monday Hon. Wheeler H. Peckham, representing the State of South Dakota, filed a bill on behalf of the Attorney-General of South Dakota and made a motion asking permission to sue the State of North Carolina to recover on the second mortgage bonds issued in aid of the construction of the Western North Carolina Railroad, which bonds were guaranteed by the State's stock in said railroad. This is the case of an original bill in equity. In such cases the court must be asked leave to bring the suit and a bill setting out the facts must be filed for the information of the court. The court then takes under advisement the whole matter, and after due consideration, decides whether or not the court has jurisdiction, and whether or not it is a proper suit for the Supreme Court to entertain. Today the Supreme Court, after due consideration, rendered its decision on the motion made by Mr. Peckham last Monday and decided that it would entertain the suit and has formally granted permission to South Dakota to proceed.
