As sure as fate, it will be this: that each year there will be more white voters disfranchised under the amendment than there will be negro voters, provided the law is honestly carried out.

Democratic Incompetency When the Democrats had control of Congress one of the things they seemed most desirous of doing was to issue Government bonds. The Democrats in North Carolina have now been in full power for two years, and have had the legislature for four years. As a result of the proverbial Democratic incompetency, they have by this time got the State in such a fix it is necessary for the Government to call on the Legislature to issue more State bonds.

LEGISLATION BLOCKED

STATEHOOD FIGHT DEGENERATE INTO A FILIBUSTER-MAY NECESSITATE EXTRA SESSION

The Cuban Reciprocity Treaty and Anti-Trust Legislation Threatened by the Fight for Admission of Territories Into Statehood. German's Latest Act in the Venezuelan Waters Strongly Criticized Here. Considered and overt act toward the United States. Senator Simmons Secures Passage in Senate of Resolution Providing for Monument to Generals Nash and Davidson. Impression Prevails Here That Wilson Post Office Controversy Will be Settled. Durham to get \$100,000 Additional for Public Building Special to the Caucasian.

Washington, D. C. January 26th, 1903: The United States Senate is practically at a standstill as far as general legislation is concerned; and the present indications are that it is likely to remain so until the Omnibus Statehood Bill is disposed of in some way. This bill is before the Senate as the regular business, and has the right of way until finished. The fight led by Senator Quay for the admission of the three territories into statehood, in opposition to the Administration measure for the admission of only one, has degenerated into a filibuster; and so earnest and persistent are Senator Quay and the friends of this Omnibus measure who are mostly Democrats, that action on the other important legislation such as the Cuban treaty and anti-trust measure, is seriously threatened, especially in view of the fact that only five weeks of the present Congress remains. Indeed, unless this troublesome measure which has been before Congress all of the session, is soon disposed of, the probability is that an extra session of Congress will become necessary in order to enact the President's pet measures, the Cuban treaty and anti-trust legislation. The President is very anxious to see the Cuban Reciprocity treaty ratified, and is equally anxious to secure the passage of some stringent anti-trust law, and it is thought that a failure in either case at this session would provoke him into calling an extra session. It is stated that the House anti-trust measure, framed by a subcommittee of the Judiciary Committee, will not be acceptable to the leaders of the Senate, which would tend to prolong the passage of this legislation.

The action of the German fleet in Venezuelan waters in shelling Fort San Carlos and killing many non-combatants and entirely destroying the village, after her acceptance of the proposition to submit her claims to the arbitration tribunal, has created considerable speculation here as to her motive. It is generally regarded here as a hostile act toward the United States. The State Department, however, is waiting for an explanation from Germany before taking any action in the matter. The popular theory here is that Germany desires to put to a test the Monroe Doctrine by attempting to cover her claims against Venezuela with Venezuelan territory. This is only a surmise of course; but if it be true, the United States Government stands ready to resort to arms to protect the famous Doctrine. It may be that Germany's latest act in Venezuelan waters was simply a blunder on the part of the commander of the fleet, and certainly this would be the most charitable light in which to view it. The House Committee has been investigating charges preferred by Congressman Lessler of New York to the effect that ex-Congressman Quigg had approached him with an offer of a money consideration if he would vote for an appropriation for submarine boats. The investigation is about concluded, and the general impression is that instead of substantiating his charges, Congressman Lessler has only succeeded in placing himself in a ridiculous position. It is understood that the chances of the Wilson post office controversy being settled in a manner satisfactory to Senator Pritchard are good. Senator Pritchard is still in the hospital, but is recovering rapidly and hopes to be out in a few days. Senator Simons has secured a resolution of the Senate providing for an appropriation of \$5000 for erection of statues to Generals Nash and Davidson. This is the same measure which Senator Butler passed through the Senate three times during his

TAX ON RUSSIAN SUGAR. Washington, D. C., Jan. 5.—In an opinion handed down by Justice Brown to-day the United States Supreme Court decided in the Downs case that the money paid by the Russian Government on sugar exported is a bounty and that the collector of customs at Baltimore was justified in levying a countervailing duty on Russian sugar under the terms of the Dingley law.

Wore a Suit of Tobacco New York, Jan. 10.—Customs Officials tonight arrested Jacob Von Sternberg charged with smuggling tobacco, and a search was made of the Red Star steamship Finland lying in the North River. Von Sternberg, who is employed on the vessel, was found to be wrapped with tobacco, which was cleverly concealed under his clothing.

ENGINEER DIES OF SMALLPOX. Statesville, Jan. 5.—Mr. H. Corum Parks died in Asheville last night about 9 o'clock. This is indeed sad news to his relatives and friends here. The cause of his death was smallpox, which it is said, he contracted in Spartanburg, S. C., and which broke out on Christmas day.
