A PROBLEM FOR THE TAXPAYERS.

The question of high taxes has become a serious one with the taxpayers in North Carolina. A great deal of property has been assessed at more than its real value, while some of the democratic "pets" have not been assessed so high.

"We will pass by the recent astonishing assessment in Raleigh levied by three men who were no more famous for good judgement than they were for owning property, and who seemed to be guided by the most optimistic views of the price of real estate within our city's sacred and unchangeable limits. We say we will pass by these gentlemen with the remark that their work has done our city an injury irreparable; and it should be a warning henceforth to County Boards to select as assessors men whose judgment of the value of property has had practical exercise in the cold and shivering realities of possession plus repairs, taxes insurance and care."

"The extent to which taxation has been carried in our towns amounts to nothing less than an abuse and a wrong. We can never have cities under present conditions. One cannot afford to own less than \$250,000 worth of property in one of our towns. Owing less, he must work like death or flee to the country to make both ends meet."

The first bale of new cotton was sold in Goldsboro last week for 111 cents. It was grown on the farm of Mr. Olie Sutton in Sampson. Sampson has the right kind of farmers as well as the right kind of politics.

CONFEDERATE REUNION.

Official Order for Next Reunion in Raleigh, October 21st.

Headquarters North Carolina Division, United Confederate Veterans, Durham, N. C., August 29, 1903.

Par. 2. Governor Aycock has loaned the tents and cooking utensils of the State Guard, which will accommodate 1,000 men, and a fund has been raised sufficient to provide clean straw for the tents and bread and coffee for the men, but they must provide themselves with other rations and bedding.

Par. 3. All ex-Confederate soldiers in North Carolina of good standing are invited to this reunion, but in order to exclude unworthy persons every veteran is required to carry with him a certificate from his camp commander or from the clerk of the Superior court, certifying that he is a veteran in good standing.

Par. 4. North Carolina's four living Ex-Confederate Generals, Hoke, Ransom, Cox and Roberts, have been invited and are expected to attend this reunion and meet once more the brave men whom they so gallantly commanded in the greatest of modern wars.

Par. 5. Miss Mary Armistead Jones, a grand-daughter of General L. O. B. Branch, is appointed division sponsor for this reunion and each brigade and camp commander is requested to appoint a sponsor.

Par. 6. The railroad companies will give a rate of one fare for the round trip, and all veterans joining in the grand parade will be admitted free into the fair grounds.

Par. 7. A full attendance is desired and as can be requested to wear their uniforms. This will be the last opportunity that many will ever have to meet their old comrades and "fight o'er their battles" again.
