





A Find in the Forum. Guided by the clue afforded in the first poem of Statius' Silvæ, and by the later modifications in the arrangement of the central portion of the Roman Forum, Signor Boni, the head director of the excavations, has now unearthed the enormous pedestal which once bore the equestrian statute of Domitian, reared in honor of that Emperor's triumphant campaign against the Cattl and Daci. The base of this colossus measures forty feet in length, twenty in width and ten in thickness, and lay about five feet beneath the present level of the Forum. Traces of the sockets wherein were the iron supports of the bronze statute and remnants of the horse's feet go to show that the horse and the figure of the Emperor Domitian were six times larger in size than the recently unearthed pedestal. with his eccentricities." Wallace, the co-discoverer with Darwin of natural selection, and Sir William Crookes, the great English chemist, who is a firm believer in spiritualism and
