

THE STATE TREASURY.

THE NEWS AND OBSERVER SAYS IT IS IN FINE SHAPE.

But Read the Following Comparison and see how the Tax-payers Money has Disappeared Under Demobratic "Good Government"-They do not Compare Favorably With Fusion Management.

The total receipts and disburse ments of the State for the fiscal year ending November 30th, 1903, were given out yesterday from the office of the State Auditor, who has just completed his work of balancing the books.

The net receipts for the year just closed were \$,2269,638 86. Adding to this the balance on hand December 1st, 1902, makes a total of \$2, 322,042.50. The disbursements have amounted to \$2,201,604.31.
