

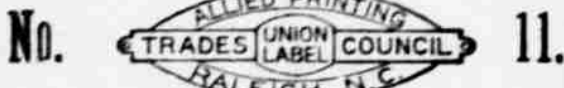

THE INVESTIGATING COMMITTEE REPORT.

The Democratic committee that was appointed by the Governor to investigate the Democratic management of the A. & N. C. Railroad made their report to the Governor a few days ago, and after being read by the Chief Executive, a copy has been furnished the newspapers.

The evidence taken on which the report was made to the Governor has not been made public. The question is will it be made public. The Committee's report is quite lengthy. It cites nearly all the charges that have been made against the State's management of the road, but in nearly every instance lengthy excuses are made to show why the officials should not be severely criticised, if criticised at all.

In speaking of the expenditure of the money the reports says: "We are of the opinion that much of this money has been wisely spent, but some of it has also been, injudiciously used, in some cases approaching downright extravagance."

Again the report says: "The idea which seems to prevail that the road-bed may be made safer and stronger by laying heavier rails upon rotten ties is a fallacy."

The reports also shows that at some small stations handsome buildings have been erected while at other stations where they were more needed no improvements have been made. It also reports that the by-laws of the company provided that the Proxy Committee shall be composed of seven stockholders, while they found that there were really 35 members and that fourteen of them are not stockholders, but still they have free passes over the road. It was also found that business men not interested in the road have free passes also. The committee reports that the road has thirty-four local attorneys, and that it was shown one of these attorneys has never appeared for the road, but to the contrary has appeared as attorney against the road in practically every case in Craven county during the present Democratic administration. But it is to be presumed that he still carries his free pass over the A. & N. C. Road. It was found that an excessive price was paid for wood and that much of the wood was taken from the land of the President of the Railroad, and that he reaped benefits from the excessive price paid for the wood. One of the agents of the road was found very much behind in his accounts. Several mileage books could not be accounted for. It was found that the Atlantic Hotel, which is owned by the road, and was run by the road last year, lost several thousand dollars. The committee also found that there was an "apparent" discrepancy of \$26,966.88, yet they did not think there should be any haste in changing the present management of the road. We will again take up and discuss the report from time to time, as we do not wish to make any one article too long and tedious for our readers.

ONLY FOR POLITICAL ENDS.

The following timely article is from the editorial page of the last issue of the Progressive Farmer: "One of our North Carolina dailies which poses as a sort of temperance organ on its editorial page, carries prominent display advertisements of mail order whiskey houses on its advertising pages. This paper would probably not accept our theory of the editor's responsibility for the character of the business men whom he takes into the homes of his patrons."

This is only another evidence of the inconsistency of the Democratic machine. We believe that the real promoters of temperance are sincere, but the Democrats have as a party joined in with them only to secure certain political ends, just as they have often joined with whiskey men to carry out certain political schemes.

WARRANT ISSUED FOR RURAL CARRIER.

Charging him With Systematic Defrauding and With Forgery.

Morning Post. Asheville, N. C. May 23.—Information has been received here from Waynesville to the effect that a warrant has been issued for H. D. Mauney charging him with defrauding various individuals out of money and with forgery. It is said that he has stolen a considerable sum of money. Mauney operated in a somewhat unique and peculiar manner, and the fact that he had not been caught sooner is perhaps due to his mode of stealing.

Mauney was employed as a rural mail carrier between Waynesville and Jonathan Creek. He collected money from persons along his route who desired to send money orders, pocket the money and subsequently destroyed the orders. He then kept tabs on these orders destroyed, and when letters came to the parties defrauded destroyed evidence of his guilt by not delivering the letters. One instance of this plan was made known, when a man living on Jonathan creek sent his son, or tried to send him, \$100, Mauney pocketed the money and when the letter was sent by the son complaining of failure to receive the sum the carrier also destroyed it. It is also charged that Mauney forged the signature of certain persons to checks which he cashed. A deputy sheriff has been given the warrant for Mauney's arrest, but so far has failed to locate his man.

AN ATTEMPTED SUICIDE. Gastonia, N. C., May 23.—Henderson Robinson, a citizen of McPelan, Lincoln county, aged 55 years, in a deranged mind caused by ill health, yesterday attempted to commit suicide by cutting his throat with a knife. He now lies at the point of death, and the physicians say he cannot live. He has a wife and family.

THE DEMOCRATIC CIRCUS.

Ten Side Shows Should be a Special Feature of the Performance. The Democrats say they have paid off \$61,000 of the State farm bonds with the surplus this year at the penitentiary. Gov. Aycock suggests that these cancelled bonds be carried to the State Convention as an object lesson of Democratic government. The (Charlotte) People's Paper commends the Governor's suggestion in the following language: "We can't see anything wrong in putting those cancelled bonds up as a side show when the circus opens. Neither can we see anything wrong in the Governor's making a report in detail on his management of the A. & N. C. Railroad for the past three years. Use it as a side show number two; tell the people how much the road and haphouse has cost the State above what it has made; tell them how much of the people's money he has spent trying to keep the road from getting into the hands of men that would make something out of it for the State or at least stop it from being a political machine and a dead weight on the tax-payers. Let us make that Exhibit No. 2."

Then, as a further side show, put up the other little batch of more than \$400,000 worth of bonds issued to meet running expenses and mark this as exhibit No. 3. As further proof of your "good government" show your record of the increase of the burden of taxation; mark this as Exhibit 4. Show that you squandered \$185,000 turned over to you by the fusionists; mark this as Exhibit 5. Show your record on the impeachment matter and mark this Exhibit 6. Show how you incorporated Democratic distilleries in this country, in order that they might continue business in the face of your Watt's bill; mark this Exhibit 7. Show the vast army of white men who were disfranchised by your poll tax scheme in the face of your anti-election pledges; mark this Exhibit 8. Show the Convention how you thrust your hands into the treasury to get money to defend criminals who violated the laws you made, marks this exhibit 9. Place before the body a panorama showing the intimidation, frauds, crimes, and even murders committed in the name of "White Supremacy"; mark this Exhibit 10.

The Public and Corruption. In the editorial department, which appears as a feature of the June McClure's, there is an appreciative review of Lincoln Steffens' book, "The Shame of the Cities," by William Allen White. Mr. Steffens' book includes articles which have appeared in McClure's Magazine on the actual government of certain typical American cities.

Mr. White in his review demonstrates his own thorough knowledge of American government and politics as well as appreciation of what Mr. Steffens has tried to show. TWO DIE SEEKING TO SAVE A THIRD. Of the Five Men in the Overladen Boat Three are Drowned, One of Them Being a Crispie. News and Observer. Greenville, N. C., May 23.—Sunday evening at Bell's Seine bench, three miles below Greenville, Allen Forbes, his son Charles and Henry Arnold, all white, were drowned.

These, with two other men, Louis Allen and Charles Braxton, were crossing the river in a canoe, the five men too much of a load for the boat, and before reaching the shore it capsized and sank in deep water. Allen and Braxton swam ashore. The senior Forbes and Arnold were also nearly ashore when they noticed young Forbes, who was a cripple struggling in the stream and went back to assist him. All three were drowned together. A messenger went to Forbes' house and found mourning there, a child having died about the same time the drowning occurred. The bodies of the three men were found today.

ATHLETICS VS. CONSUMPTION.

No Exercise for Tuberculous Patients. "There must be no exercise as exercise for the consumption patient," says Eugene Wood in Everybody's Magazine for June. "If you are able and feel like it, amuse yourself, but don't take exercise to build your system up. I know. I, too, have heard those stories about men given up to die, who began work in a gymnasium and by violent exercise entirely recovered their health. You mustn't believe all the physical-culture people tell you, any more than all the patent-medicine people can tell you. They're both in the miracle business. When the lung tissue is attacked by tuberculosis it heals, if it heals at all, by this fibrous, scar-material filling in the cavity. No new lung-tissue is formed to replace what has been lost, and this scar-material is useless for breathing. Suppose you had a deep cut in your hand, and you kept working that hand violently, how long do you think it would take the cut to heal? When exercise is taken or you "expand the lungs," you have to work the lung-tissue just as you work your hand, and if it is wounded there will be a much larger proportion of scar-material useless for breathing when it does not get well. It is a practice now to make the affected lung immovable with strips of adhesive plaster, and to inject it with nitrogen gas, so that the lung won't work."

Negro Suspected of Having Carved up his Wife. Columbia, S. C., May 23.—The disappearance of Mary Hightower, wife of Tom Hightower, a middle aged colored woman, from her home near Tatum Marlborough county, on Wednesday last, was explained yesterday by the finding of parts of dismembered body, which were buried in two different places, the legs from the knees down still missing. A party of 200 negroes had been searching all day for the missing woman in the woods and numerous boys in that section.

The dismembered parts had been disjointed and cut of as if it had been done by a surgeon. Hightower and his wife are said to have quarreled on Tuesday night. He has not been seen since the disappearance.

Smallpox in North Carolina. Washington Post. Raleigh, N. C. May 20.—The bulletin of the Stat board of health issued to day reports smallpox in 37 counties, the total number of cases being 700. Ashe County leads, with 200 cases and Durham has 215. The number of cases since the disease appeared in North Carolina five years ago is more than 9,000.
