RALEIGH DISPENSARY VIOLATES THE LAW.

Management Has to Pay a Penalty and Take Out Wholesale License--Managers May Be Indicted.

The Raleigh Post last Friday made known the fact that the Raleigh Dispensary had been selling beer by the barrel to a restaurant and to others in Raleigh, which could not be legally done without a wholesale license, and even though it would seem that if the Watts law was any good at all, it would prevent such wholesale business. However, a federal officer was sent upon the management of the dispensary and requested the manager to take out a wholesale license. The manager wanted the federal officer to go with him to see the dispensary attorney, but the officer did not have time to chase over town to see a lawyer, and in fact was not looking for a lawyer, but was looking for money for a license and a penalty for violating the law. When the dispensary management saw that the federal officer understood his business, the money was paid over without further delay. The Post says that United States Commissioner Joan Nichols said he would issue a warrant for the arrest of each of the three dispensary commissioners, the manager and the other employees, if anyone will make the complaint before him.

The dispensary did a rushing business last week. It is said they "took in" about \$250 per minute for one or two days last week. We had been told that the dispensary was intended to decrease the sale of intoxicants, but the object now seems to be to sell as much as possible, so as to justify the managing board in increasing the salaries of its officers.

THE FRED DOUGLASS INCIDENT RECALLED.

Democratic Judge and Bar Adjourning on a Bench Negro--Is This an Appeal for the Negro Vote?

Charleston News and Courier. We have seen nothing in any of our negro loving Northern contemporaries to match the very remarkable incident that occurred at Lancaster, South Carolina, yesterday. When the court convened there, yesterday morning Mr. E. E. Allison, the oldest member of the Lancaster bar, announced the death of Bishop Isham Clinton, of the African Methodist church, and moved that the court adjourn in respect to his memory until Monday next. The motion was seconded by Major Wylie, of the Lancaster bar, and by Solicitor Henry. The speakers all paid proper tribute to the lamented dead, and Judge Waite granted the motion and ordered the adjournment of the court, expressing his high appreciation of the character and services of the Bishop to his people and to the cause of religion.

Bishop Clinton was a negro and had been exercising the office of the ministry for more than fifty years. He was a slave in his early life and lived at peace with his white neighbors all his life. They knew him and he knew them and between them existed the kindest relationship. So deeply had he impressed them with the earnestness of his religion and the good quality of his citizenship that when he died they all sorrowed that he had passed away. The action of the court in Lancaster yesterday was a notable tribute to the dead Bishop. The lawyer on whose motion the court adjourned, and the lawyers who seconded the motion and the judge who granted the motion are all native South Carolinians and in their desire to honor the memory of a negro bishop they speak as they were moved by the natural promptings of their hearts. They were not hating the negro vote or trying to corner the delegates to a nominating convention.

AN ADDRESS

To the Voters of the State, by Chairman Stanford and Other Prominent Citizens.

To the Voters of North Carolina: More than a century ago, Thomas Jefferson, the greatest statesman in our judgment, this world has produced, enunciated certain fundamental principles on which all free, popular governments should rest; and the highest tribute that can be paid to his magnificent statesmanship, far-seeing wisdom and inspired knowledge of the science of free government, is that the glorious principles of Democracy, wherein "equal and exact justice to all men," is one of the chief corner stones of his creed, are as applicable to a just and proper solution of the evil political conditions existing today as when the immortal statesman gave them to our nation and the world.

Having a firm and unflinching faith in the ultimate triumph of these principles, and believing them to be absolutely essential to the preservation and perpetuity of free institutions; and in view of the fact that William J. Bryan, for eight years the recognized leader of the Democratic party, was ignored and deposed as the leader at the St. Louis national convention, when the party repudiated Jeffersonian Democracy and nominated the candidate of Wall Street (as Mr. Bryan declares him to be), it behooves those who are unwilling to sacrifice their principles and stifle their political convictions to join with the party that still bravely and fearlessly upholds the true principles of Jefferson and Bryan; and to that end we earnestly invite and urge all men who love principles better than party or self to begin at once the organization of People's party clubs for the dissemination of literature and the discussion of the true principles on which our government was established.

Since the party of Bryan has betrayed the great trust confided to it by the people, in the repudiation of those principles which secured six and a half million voters, the People's party, with renewed energy, vigor and courage, has come to the front to battle for the principles of Jefferson, and now holds aloft the banner, so recently held by William J. Bryan, and appeals to the men who so loyally supported him two campaigns, to rally to the People's party standard—the only party that now truly represents the millions in this country who are suffering in consequence of the unjust and unequal conditions brought about by trust domination and the concentration of the wealth of the country in the hands of the few. To change these conditions and restore this great government to the people to whom it properly belongs, we believe it to be the earnest hope and patriotic desire of all men who love Justice, Liberty and Equality of all men before the law.

To the unprejudiced mind it is as clear as the noon-day sun that both the old parties are now diligently engaged in fighting a sham battle and thereby beclouding the real issues of the campaign. Both of the old parties are now on the side of the Trusts, Monopolists and Combines; both of them are on the side of corporate greed and pompered wealth. This nation, where Liberty, Justice and Equality of opportunity are supposed to be guaranteed to all men, has no need for two Republican parties—two parties serving Monopoly and Mammon, hence the need for a party to champion and defend the rights of the "forgotten man."

The people of Rome, Greece, Babylon, Persia and Egypt, lost their liberties when all the wealth of those countries became concentrated in the hands of the few, and to prevent the "sordid despotism of wealth," and the "communism of pell" from wrecking and destroying our nation it behooves all men who are "unawed by power, unbribed by gain," to unite with the Peoples party in the coming political contest. From neither of the old parties can the masses expect any relief; there is low no material difference in their platform declarations. William J. Bryan, in a recent statement, declares that "a Democratic victory will mean, very little, if any progress on economic questions so long as the party is under the control of the Wall Street element. On the money question Mr Parker is as thoroughly committed to the side of the financiers as Mr. Roosevelt. Nothing can be expected of him on the money question. On the trust question the Democratic platform is very much better than the Republican platform, but the nomination of Judge Parker virtually nullifies the anti-trust plank."

Now, this plain and frank declaration from Mr Bryan shows b-y-o-d "plain people," as Lincoln called them, have no ground for the hope of relief and reform through the Democratic party; therefore, every Democrat who believes in Bryan's principles and supported him in two campaigns is stopped from attacking the People's party for its refusal to surrender to Plutocracy.

Judge Parker, in his speech of acceptance, says: "It is a fact that should be frankly conceded that should our party be successful in the coming contest we cannot hope to secure a majority in the Senate during the next four years, and hence we shall be unable to secure any modification of the tariff save that to which the Republican majority in the Senate may consent." This is, indeed, a frank confession that should a Democratic President be elected he can accomplish nothing.

MR. MEEKINS' STATEMENT.

His Effort to Meet Mr. Glenn the Republican Candidate for Lieutenant Governor.

In an Open Letter to Chairman Rollins, Describes His Offer of \$500 for the Privilege of Meeting the Democratic Gubernatorial Candidate on the Stump—Mr. Glenn's Reference to the Roosevelt Writings the Point of Issue—He Wishes the Public to Know Exactly What Occurred.

The Observer is requested to publish the following: Elizabeth City, N. C., Oct. 14, '04. Hon. Thomas S. Rollins, Chairman, Republican State Executive Committee, Greensboro, N. C.

My Dear Mr. Rollins: In a public speech addressed to my fellow-citizens at Clinton, Sampson county, N. C., on Tuesday, October 4th, 1904, I took occasion to step out of the record and remarked as follows:

My fellow citizens, Hon. R. B. Glenn, the Democratic candidate for Governor of North Carolina has seen fit, for reasons best known to himself, to malign the President of the United States through the medium of misquoting him, thereby misleading the people of North Carolina. Mr. Glenn said, as I understand, the President said, "There is a strain of coarse brutality running through the blood of the Southern people."

"Now my fellow-citizens, what the President said vastly differs from what Mr. Glenn claims he said. I hold in my hand a book from which Mr. Glenn quoted the President. Said book is entitled "Thomas H. Benton, by Roosevelt," and is one of 32 volumes in the "American Statesmen." On page 161 is found the quotation in question, and it reads as follows: "Slavery WAS chiefly responsible for the streak of coarse and brutal barbarism which ran through the Southern character, and which MARKED the ferocious outery instantly raised by the whole Southern press against the abolitionists."

"Now fellow-citizens, you can readily see the difference between the two statements. According to Mr. Glenn, an uninformed citizen would gather the idea that President Roosevelt made this statement but yesterday, in speaking of a condition which exists in the Southern States TODAY, whereas, the truth is, the statement was made by Mr. Roosevelt as far back as 1886, and referred to a period in the national history as far back as 1833. Now I submit in all fairness if slavery was right, then Mr. Roosevelt was wrong; if slavery was wrong then Mr. Roosevelt was right. Is there a man in this audience or in the State of North Carolina who has the nerve to stand up and face me and say, with his hand on his heart, and his conscience towards God, that slavery was right? I would like to see the color of the man's hair who has the nerve, in this enlightened age, to stand for such a sentiment.

"Viewing the situation in all of its details, as I see it, but one of two things can be true; Mr. Glenn either misquoted the President through a misapprehension of what the President had said, or he did it with the intent to mislead the people, and the extenuating circumstance consists in giving Mr. Glenn the benefit of the doubt, and to my mind the doubt is not worth the claiming.

"My fellow-citizens, I will give \$500 for an opportunity of facing Mr. Glenn in a crowded hall filled with intelligent North Carolinians, and discuss with him what I determine to be an unfair attack upon the President of the United States, thus violating the injunction of the

scriptural text, "Curse thou not the ruler of thy country."

"The statement of mine with respect to the five hundred dollar proposition was given to the press of North Carolina in a spirit of ridicule. On October 7th, 1904, I chanced to meet Mr. Glenn in the dining room of the Beahow Hotel, in Greensboro, N. C., and he at once said to quote: "You must have a very lucrative office to be offering \$500 for the opportunity of meeting me a joint debate. Give me the money and you shall be accommodated." I treated the challenge as jocular. But in an hour or so thereafter Mr. Glenn came into the Federal court house and in the presence of several gentlemen, and in a twitting manner, said to me, "Where is that \$500; I want it, and need it, and hope it is forthcoming. Let it be and you shall be accommodated."

I said, "Very well, sir," and immediately retired from the court house and prepared the following communication to Mr. Glenn, which speaks for itself:

"Greensboro, N. C., Oct. 7, '04. "Honorable R. B. Glenn, Greensboro, N. C."

"My Dear Mr. Glenn: I stated last Tuesday in a public speech at Clinton, N. C., that I would give \$500 for an opportunity of a joint debate with you upon the issues of this campaign, and especially upon the issue of your quotation, from the President's book—"Life of Benton." You said to me this morning in the court house in Greensboro, N. C., in the presence of several gentlemen, that if I would give you the money you would accord me the privilege of a joint discussion.

"I herewith hand you my certified check in the sum of \$500 as evidence of my good faith in this transaction. I would thank you to notify me immediately where your next appointment is, that I may meet you and go with you through the remaining days of the campaign. "This proposition is made with the distinct understanding that you cancel none of your dates, but that you will guarantee to show up at each place as advertised, during this campaign.
