NEW INDUSTRY ON CAPE FEAR. A Fertilizer Plant That Turns Out 25 to 30 Tons a Day.

Wilmington, N. C., March 13. -A new industry has just been put in operation twenty odd miles up the Cape Fear River that is owned and managed by a Wilmington man, Mr. B. F. Keith. The industry is for the manufacture of land plaster.

The factory occupies a site at what is known as Neal's Eddy, but which before the Revolutionary War was called Port Vernon.

The new plant embraces an outlay of many hundreds of dollars. It started up last Wednesday and since then has been turning out land plaster to its fullest capacity, which is between 25 and 30 tons per day. This means that phosphate lime rock is being crushed to that extent every day unless the weather is too inclement to permit work. The rock has been thoroughly tested and shows between eight and ninety per cent. carbonate of lime. It has also been practically tried by Mr. Keith on his vast farm and by several other extensive farmers and it has always proven of the best quality of fertilizer for corn, peanuts, potatoes, etc.

Mr. Keith says the deposit of rock is enough to last for years and that the machinery he has installed will enable him to furnish it to the trade promptly. He has now several big orders to fill and is ready to fill more on short notice.

Vastness of the Canal Project. Boston Globe. The celebrity with which under modern conditions the Isthmian canal can be dug is indicated by the estimate of the chief engineer that with 100 steam shovels installed, with complete system of tracks serving them, a yearly record of 30,000,000 cubic yards of excavation may be reached without requiring a greater output per shovel or greater speed in working than has already been attained. And the magnitude of the undertaking is shown by the statement that, at this rate of progress, to complete a seal level canal, with a tidal lock 1,000 feet long and 100 feet usually wide, at Miraflores, with take from ten to twelve years.
