T. B. COLLINS INSANE, PLACED IN JAIL.

Had Attempted to Shoot His Neighbors—Arrested With Difficulty.

Deputy Sheriff T. H. Walls, of Apex, brought T. B. Collins, an aged white man who lives six miles from Apex, to Raleigh Saturday afternoon and placed him in jail until arrangements can be made for placing the man in the State Hospital.

Collins has been losing his mind for several years, and Friday he struck Mr. L. E. McNeill, a neighbor, over the head with a stick, inflicting a severe scalp wound. He had also threatened to shoot some of his neighbors, and the community had become frightened on account of him.

When Deputy Sheriff Walls attempted to rescue Collins, he was met with formidable resistance. Collins tried to kill the deputy and he was arrested only after three men had come to the rescue.

The annual farmers' institute of Duplin County is being held in Warsaw today.

The wife of Dr. H. A. McSwain, a prominent citizen of Cumberland County, died in Fayetteville Thursday while she was being taken to the hospital.

Henry Broadway, aged sixty-years, a farmer of Davidson County, was stricken with heart failure while in a melon patch at his home Saturday, and died from the effects of the stroke. He was a Confederate veteran and leaves a large family of grown children.

REFUSED TO KISS HER MOTHER.

Touching Scene at Charlotte Depot—Result of a Divorce.

"No, I don't love you; don't kiss me any more." This was the unchildlike statement made by little Irene Glenn, the 9-year old daughter of Mrs. Thomas B. Young, to her mother at the Southern station yesterday morning. It was the climax of a long separation of mother and daughter. Several months ago Mrs. Glenn was divorced from her husband, P. N. Glenn, in Mecklenburg Superior Court. The judge gave the father the custody of the child, who was taken with him to his home in Gastonia. Almost immediately after the divorce was granted Mrs. Glenn married Thomas B. Young, of this city.

Irene stopped over in Charlotte yesterday with an uncle and aunt, on their way to Columbia, S. C. Mrs. Young also happened to be at the station. Upon sight of the little girl the mother rushed to her, caressed her and begged for a kiss. The daughter screamed into the maternal ears that she no longer had the natural love of child for mother. The aunt came to the assistance of her niece and the mother walked away the object of pity from a crowd of bystanders who had witnessed the unusual incident.

Mrs. Young is still making her home in Charlotte and is well known here. She is rather a good looking woman.

NEGRO FILLED WITH BUCKSHOT.

While He Played An Accordion An Unknown Miscreant Shot Him Dead. Special to Charlotte Observer.]

Scotland Neck, Aug. 17.—Wednesday night there was a foul murder at the home of Mr. Manza White, about six miles from Scotland Neck. A colored man named Ellis Merritt was shot and instantly killed while minding a tobacco barn. He was left alone about 12 o'clock, and soon after he was left a shot was heard but little attention was paid to it.

The next morning the man was found dead and stiff. He was playing an accordion when shot, and when turned over his fingers still clasped the keys of the instrument.

By reason of some circumstances there was a little suspicion against a colored boy named Hardy. He was arrested and a hearing was had, but in the absence of evidence he was released.

It was rumored that some one yesterday received a letter from the dead man's aunt near Enfield, telling him to come at once and let no one know of his coming. He came to this community from Enfield about six months ago. Further than the letter there is no clue to the perpetrator of the deed, for the murdered man is said to have been on good terms with everybody in the community who knew him.

SECRETARY OF WAR TAFT TO RETIRE FROM CABINET.

Will Cable Resignation from Manila Sometime During the Month of October—After Visit to the Philippines He Will Go to Germany and Russia on His Globe-Trotting Tour.

Columbus, O., Aug. 20.—Immediately after opening the Philippine parliament in October Hon. W. H. Taft will resign the Secretaryship of War and his formal resignation will come by cable—if it is not already in the President's hands—to take effect at that time.

Leaving the Philippines he will make his trip through Russia and Germany, meeting the Czar and the Kaiser, merely as an American citizen and in no official capacity. When he lands on United States soil after practically completing his circuit of the globe he will enter actively into the campaign for Republican nomination for President. This is the Secretary's program as it became definitely known to Ohioans last night and it is not likely to be subject to any change.
