



## WHEEL CUPBOARD.

Is constructed as a help to the woman without a servant. The dinner prepared in the kitchen may be placed in it, with the empty dishes on top. The cupboard may be made with little excense by any man who has a plane and a few other common house hold tools. A list of items for its construction is as follows: Sixty feet one-half inch white wood, \$3: 4 wheels and 2 axies, \$1.25 2 pairs brass hinges, 30 cents; 2 brass knebs, 15 cents; screens, glue, etc. 25 cents; stain, 20 cents; total-\$5.10. 
TO IRON A TURNDOWN COLLAR The method of ironing a turndown rollar depends entirely on its shape If the top fold has no "spring" and the collar lies fiat on the table, the froning in that case is done as for a straight collar. But if the outer fold is more shaped than the band, it is then impossible to from the entire coltar at once. It is then advisable to from the straight hand until dry, and then the outer part of the collar by placing it into shape on the table and ironing it until smooth and dry. The collars are polished like straight collars, but before folding over they should be slightly damped on the wrong side, where the fold is to be made, and a hot iron passed over the damp part. The steam passes through the sur

face fold making it slightly soft, and prevents the stiff linen cracking when it is folded, thus preserving the collar -New York Press.
