Local Matters.

The contract for the State printing has again been awarded to E. M. Uzell & Co. and Edwards & Broughton Company, both printing concerns of this city.

John Golins, colored, who shot and killed W. H. Lowery, white, in Moore County some weeks ago, surrendered to the sheriff of Moore last week and was brought to the State Prison for safe-keeping.

Mr. John W. Clark, assistant superintendent of the Erwin Cotton Mills at Durham, was brought to Raleigh yesterday to the home of his sister, Chief Justice Walter Clark, suffering with appendicitis.

On September 4th, Labor Day, there will be held in this city the seventh annual fiddlers' convention under the direction of Mr. W. J. Andrews. It will be held in the A. & M. College auditorium and only good old-fashioned fiddlers will be eligible.

Zolie Coley, a notorious blockader, who has been operating in Durham County for many years, was tried in Raleigh Saturday on this charge. Coley was captured in Wake County near the Durham County line. There were four cases against the defendant and he was bound over to Federal Court under a bond of \$600.

Zack Marks, who is under arrest in Florida, is to be brought back to Harnett County, this State, where he formerly lived, to answer the charge of murder. He is charged with killing Charles Ellen in Black River Township. The killing was October 22, 1902. Governor Kitchin has issued the requisition on the Governor of Florida for the prisoner, and a Harnett County official has left for Florida to bring the prisoner back.

Mr. S. R. Seymour Appointed Postmaster at West Raleigh.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 15.—The President to-day sent to the Senate the nomination of S. R. Seymour to be postmaster at West Raleigh.

Mr. W. G. Riddick Dies Suddenly.

Mr. W. G. Riddick died Tuesday at the home of his brother, Dr. J. G. Riddick, in this city. Mr. Riddick was cashier of the bank of Youngsville.

Bobbitt-Wynne Drug Company in Hands of Receiver.

The Bobbitt-Wynne Drug Company was placed in the hands of a receiver Friday night by Judge Daniels following a refusal of creditors of the company to accept a 40 per cent compromise on the dollar. J. S. Wynne was named as the receiver.

The drug-store was closed yesterday taking an inventory.

Governor Issues Pardon to Four Prisoners.

Governor Kitchin has issued pardons to the following-named prisoners:

Jim Lomax, of Gaston County, sentenced to five years, November term, 1908, for larceny.

Will Bassett, of Buncombe County, who was serving four months on road for selling liquor.

Sanford Leagon, Cleveland County, who was sentenced to six months on the roads for "moonshining."

Will Downey, Granville County, who was serving six months' sentence for manufacturing liquor.

CONDUCTOR SCALDED TO DEATH.

Walter Finch, of Raleigh, Dies of Injuries—Engineer and Fireman Injured When Crown-Plate Blew Down.

Conductor Walter Finch, who was terribly scalded Friday evening in an explosion of a locomotive on the Seaboard Air Line five miles west of Raleigh, died at Rex Hospital Saturday morning. Engineer Steven Stogner and the colored fireman, John Maxey, are improving steadily and will recover.

The freight train had just left Johnson Street station here as No. 19, Raleigh to Hamlet, when the accident occurred.

When the train reached the five mile post, which is about two miles west of Method, there was a crash and a sizzle, as the crown-plate, which is the roof of the fire-box, blew down. This allowed the steam to flow into the fire-box. Immediately the fire-box flew open and the steam poured out. Engineer Stogner jumped and fell on the side of the track. As he jumped he called to the fireman to do likewise, but Maxey did not jump.

Grand Encampment of Odd Fellows in Raleigh.

The sixty-fourth annual session of the North Carolina Grand Encampment, I. O. O. F., convened in the Odd Fellows' hall, in the Home Building, in this city, Tuesday afternoon with nearly forty delegates. There are in the State thirty-five local encampments with a total membership of 1,500.

MR. JOB WYATT SUICIDES.

Was President of a Large Mercantile House in Raleigh.

Mr. Job P. Wyatt, head of the mercantile firm of Job P. Wyatt, Sons & Company, dealers in farm supplies and machinery on Martin Street of this city, attempted to take his own life Friday by cutting his throat with a razor. He had been unwell for a week, and in a fit of despondency he got out of bed about 4 o'clock in the morning and inflicted two deep, long gashes in the left side of his throat.

His condition remained critical until Tuesday morning, when in an unguarded moment he tore the stitches from his throat and died shortly afterwards. He leaves three sons, who were associated with him in business; also a daughter, Mrs. C. P. Norris, of Durham.

STATE FARMERS' CONVENTION.

Meeting Will Be Held at A. & M. College August 29th to 31st, Inclusive—Women's Farm Life Convention.

A State Farmers' Convention will be held at the A. & M. College, West Raleigh, August 29th to 31st, inclusive.

Tobacco Curing, Farm Seeds, Field Selection Seed Corn, Stock Judging, Feeding of Farm Animals, and other subjects of interest to the farmers, will be discussed by men who have made each line a study. The College will furnish rooms free, but all who intend stopping at the College are requested to bring sheets and pillow, if they wish one. Meals will be furnished at the College at 25 cents.

The Women's Farm Life Convention will be held at the College at the same time. Beautifying the Farm Home, Raising Poultry and Preparing it for Market, How to Make Quick Bread, Dressmaking, and other subjects of interest, will be discussed by special lady speakers.

DR. McCULLERS WILL ENTER SUIT.

Wake Democrats in Row Over Plea, and Just How it Shall Be Handed Out.

There was a report in the last issue of The Caucasian of the County Commissioners' refusal to pay Dr. McCullers' fees as county physician, or to recognize him as county physician and to add more fuel to the flame the commissioners have notified Sheriff Sears that he must not permit Dr. McCullers in the jail to see such prisoners. If they need medical aid the jailer has been instructed to send for Dr. Stephenson. Dr. McCullers has employed counsel and it is understood he will fight the matter to a finish.
