ANOTHER RECKLESS SHOOTING.

Henderson Policees Fatally Wounded Drunken Prisoner—The Shooting Causes Lady to Faint.

Henderson, N. C., Sept. 10.—Much excitement was created on the streets this evening a few minutes before 6 o'clock, when Officer Champion shot William J. Bailey. Bailey may die.

From the version of Champion, he placed Bailey under arrest for drunkenness. Bailey grappled with the officer, throwing his arms around his neck, and the officer fired, one ball entering the arm below the shoulder and the second ball lodging in the back.

Champion has been placed under \$500 bond. A lady and gentleman were walking near the scene at the time and when the shooting began the lady fainted and had to be taken home.

The last report is that Bailey is unconscious and sinking.

BEATTIE FOUND GUILTY.

Sentenced to Die in the Electric Chair November 24th—Petition for Writ of Error.

Chesterfield, Va., Sept. 8.—The case of Henry Clay Beattie, Jr., indicted for wife murder, went into the hands of the jury at 5:08 p. m., and after being out 58 minutes, returned a verdict of guilty. The judge then sent them back to determine the degree of guilt, which required only a few moments. Then came the verdict of murder in the first degree, the penalty of which is death by electrocution. November 24th was fixed for the execution. Ninety days stay of execution has been granted, however, within which to file a petition for the writ of error from the Supreme Court of Appeals of Virginia, which meets in November.

More Democratic Incompetence.

Clerical errors in Atlanta's new charter, granted by the recent Legislature, have ruined the chances of having it voted on this month. The advocates of the change are wroth and are going to reform the Legislature, insisting that the present system, with its incompetent copying clerks, appointed for political reasons, must be abolished.—Charlotte Observer.

So the Georgia Legislature had incompetent employes in important positions who were appointed for political reasons, too. But that is an old story in Democratic States.—Albany Chronicle.

ITALIANS CRAZED BY EPIDEMIC.

Fearing That Cholera Patients Would Be Killed by Government They Stormed Hospital, Removed Patients and Burned Hospital—Several Officers Wounded.

Chiasso, Switzerland, Sept. 9.—Savage excesses have been committed as a result of the cholera epidemic now raging in Italy, in Gioia del Colle, a town of 9,000 in the Italian province of Bari, according to official reports received here.

The disease is said to have reduced the inhabitants of the town to a condition of desperation. The authorities, in an effort to stamp out the infection, ordered that all persons attacked by cholera should be taken to a hospital and that those who had been in contact with cholera victims be isolated in a neighborhood building.

Convinced that it was the intention of the authorities to kill the patients and also those under observation, a crowd stormed the hospital and threatened to burn it if interfered with in releasing the cholera-stricken inmates.

A small force of carabinieri, aided by a few policemen, attempted to control the crowds, but the ferocious attitude of the demonstrators soon made it apparent to the authorities that the police were inadequate to cope with the situation, and in order to avoid bloodshed, the doors of the hospital were thrown open.

The crowds rushed into the building, brought out the cholera patients and carried them in ghastly procession through the town. The thoroughfares were lined with people who acclaimed the cholera victims and shouted imprecations against the government. The cholera suspects under observation were also set free among similar scenes of frantic enthusiasm enacted by the people.

While the municipal council of Lecce was in session to-day discussing the best measures for combating the cholera, thousands of demonstrators howling "Death!" "Death!" gathered about the city hall. The mayor and councilors suspended the meeting and escaped from the building. The mob then moved toward the cholera hospital, keeping up a running fight with the police, who were unable to stop the marching crowd. Several policemen and some of the towns-people were dangerously injured.

The mob entered the hospital and after carrying out the patients, smashed the furniture and set fire to the building. The patients, some of whom were in a dying condition, were carried triumphantly through the streets. The general belief of the people is that the doctors inoculate cholera-stricken persons with poison.
