Friends and political advisers of President Taft have nearly completed their work to bring about the resignation of the President at the next Republican national convention.

Postmaster-General Hitchcock has announced that he has retired from the chairmanship of the national committee, and that a successor is holding the office.

These leaders declare is not so; that Mr. Hitchcock has not resigned and cannot resign until there is a meeting of the executive committee of the national committee.

There will be a meeting of the national committee in the early part of December. Soon after there will be a meeting of the President's friends and political advisers at the White House for the purpose of putting the Postmaster-General out of commission, politically.

T. L. Farrow, Sr., of Winston, Commits Suicide. Winston-Salem, N. C., Sept. 26.—Lying on his back at the foot of an altar in the Masonic Lodge room on the fifth floor of the Masonic Temple with a bullet wound in his right temple, just above the ear and a 32-calibre Remington revolver on the floor about a foot away, the body of Mr. T. L. Farrow, Sr., aged fifty-four years, was found this afternoon by the colored janitor at the Masonic Temple.

The opinion is that the shot was fired while Mr. Farrow had his hand on the Bible and was kneeling at the altar. A note was left by the deceased giving instructions about the disposition of his body, and saying that he did not see any "use in trying to fight it out."

Coroner Called to Sit on Amputated Leg. Durham, N. C., Sept. 26.—Coroner Jordan was today called into the country a mile or two by the finding of an amputated leg belonging to an unknown colored man.

Two colored boys were rummaging about in the woods and ran upon a lard can thrown into a ravine. They opened it and found the dismembered part. It was an abnormally large leg, bigger at the ankle than it could possibly have been at the hip.

BRUTAL MURDERS IN MEXICO.

Children Thrown into the Air and Cut to Pieces With Lances as They Descend. Mexico City, Mex., Sept. 26.—Wenceslao Franco, a resident of Acala, a small town in the State of Chiapas, was crucified by the rebellious Chamula Indians when they sacked that place last Saturday, according to telegrams received by El Imparcial to-night from Tuxtla Gutierrez, the State capital.

The story was brought to the Red Cross headquarters today by Franco's wife and later confirmed from other sources. The woman herself had been left for dead, after having been stabbed several times with a lance by an Indian.

According to the stories that have reached Tuxtla Gutierrez, the Insurrectos committed their depredations in a manner most barbarous. Women and children were slaughtered by the mobs, one of whose leaders was a fanatical priest.
