Local Matters.

The work of grading the street extension from Glenwood to the Country Club is progressing rapidly and is expected to be completed by October 1st.

Chief of Police J. P. Stell has been requested to serve until October 1, 1912, his new term to begin the first day of next month. There were two other applicants for the position.

A special venire of seventy-five men have been summoned to try L. J. Norris to-morrow (Friday) on the charge of murdering J. B. Bissett. Norris will endeavor to prove an alibi.

Rev. A. J. Monerief, pastor of the Tabernacle Church for the past three years, has resigned and accepted the pastorate of the First Baptist Church at Barnesville, Ga. He leaves October 15th.

Governor Kitchin has offered a reward of \$100 for the capture of James Pittman, who is wanted in Bertie County for the murder of Lee Howard on August 25th. Both are negroes.

Dr. John A. Ferrell has returned from Nashville, Tenn., where he attended the Southern Conference of the hookworm forces. He was chosen President of the Association in recognition of his work in North Carolina.

Representatives of the Associated Press of Virginia and North Carolina will be held in the hotel parlor of Hotel Raleigh Monday, October 2nd, at noon. The object will be the swapping of ideas and improvement of the service.

Mrs. Lina Barbour, wife of Mr. J. M. Barbour, died at the home of her father, Mr. J. C. Sauls, on North Dawson Street, Monday afternoon. She is survived by her father, six sisters, two brothers, and three small children.

A new railroad warehouse is in the course of construction in the rear of the freight warehouses of the Raleigh and Southport Railway. Said building is to be fifty feet square and is to be used for the handling of meats, with trackage for fifteen cars.

Walter Suggs, a young white man of Holly Springs Township, charged with blockading, and Jim Michner, colored, of near Eagle Rock, also charged with retailing, were tried before United States Commissioner Nichols Tuesday, and bound over to Federal Court.

The North Carolina Insurance Department has leased the Woman's Club building, and the offices of Commissioner Young's force will occupy this building until the completion of the new State building, which will be built on the space now occupied by the insurance building.

Plans are being made for the erection of the new Christian Church on Hillsboro Street. It is to be of brick with stone trimmings. The auditorium is to seat 550, and there will be ten Sunday-school rooms and a Sunday-school auditorium. The new building is to cost \$16,000.

Four new prisoners have been brought to the State's Prison to serve terms. They are: John Cabarrus, house-breaking, five years; Tom Ridd, house-breaking, three years; David Morris, house-breaking, five years; and Raymond Moose, murder in the second degree, fifteen years.

The special committee, of which Wade R. Brown is chairman, for the ceremonies that will mark the dedication of the great auditorium during the State Fair, is anxious to hear suggestions from the cities of the State in regard to noted singers of their respective towns enlisting in the great concert for Wednesday night of Fair.

Deputy Insurance Commissioner W. A. Scott is in Wilmington this week as one of the witnesses in the prosecution of J. C. Holly for the burning of the Rock Springs Hotel to cover the murder of a boy that was living with him, the purpose alleged to be the collecting of insurance principally on the life of the boy. Holly has been convicted and sentenced to electrocution.

Harnett County Woman Refuses Free Treatment—Sent Home.

Through the efforts of Superintendent R. S. Stephenson, of the Associated Charities, a woman and two children were sent to the mother's old home in Harnett County yesterday. Two wagons were secured to have them moved.

The mother and both of the children were infected with the hookworm disease. They had been urged to take the treatment, but refused, the mother declaring: "I want to go back to my old home in Harnett County to die." She owns a small farm in that county. The health authorities had told the woman that if she would take the treatment and let it be administered to the children, that they would furnish it free of charge, but she insisted that she rather go back to Harnett to die, so Superintendent Stephenson had her sent.

GREAT STATE FAIR

Will be a Large Exhibit of Agricultural Products—Lincoln Beachey and His Flying Machine Will be Here.

The management of the State Fair states that the entries so far indicate a very large agricultural exhibit this year. Last year there were 83 car-loads of exhibits, an increase of nearly double the preceding year. The outlook this year bids fair to show an even greater increase.

Interest in the agricultural exhibits is stimulated by corn-growing contests among the boys, and cotton contests among the men, and to this is added a new feature, that of a tomato-growing contest among the girls. There are a number of additional prizes in the purely agricultural features of the Fair, making this important department especially attractive.

The amusement features surpass any preceding State Fair. The aeroplane flight of Lincoln Beachey will be the special feature of this end. The terms of the agreement with the aeroplane managers are that they give three flights daily and nothing but a wind that will make flying dangerous to the life of the aviator, will prevent the flights. California Frank's Wild West Show will also be on hand to entertain the crowd. Altogether the amusement features provided by the Fair management will alone be worth coming to see aside from the number of entertainments that are to be usually found along the "Midway."

Of special interest to stock-raisers and breeders is the announcement that the Percheron Society of America will honor the North Carolina State Fair as one of the four Southern fairs at which special prizes will be awarded.

The present Fair management has been devoting considerable expense to the erection of a safe and commodious building for the proper care of the exhibits and its visitors. Last year a large concrete building was added and this year another up-to-date building for the poultry exhibit will be added. It is the intention to add a new, modern, fire-proof building each year from the profits and it is hoped to soon have all the buildings one harmonious arrangement, and to thus do away with the present wooden and somewhat out of date ones.

In this connection the management yesterday made announcement that life membership would be sold for twenty dollars. This membership certificate entitles the member, his wife and children under twelve years of age, during the life of the member. Secretary Joseph E. Pogue will be glad to answer any inquiries regarding this life memberships.

Announcement of special features will be made as they are perfected. The outlook, as stated, is better at this date than ever before known, and it is confidently expected that the air of last year will be excelled three weeks hence.

STILL NO COUNTY PHYSICIAN.

County Commissioners Refuse to Agree to Propositions Made by the Board of Health.

The Board of Health and County Commissioners of Wake have failed to reach an agreement as to their differences with reference to the employment of the county physician and the regulations with reference to the supervision and control of the penal and charitable institutions of Wake County.

The commissioners still say that Dr. McCullers must work for \$600 a year and must visit County Home, jail and convict camps on prescribed days or be fined \$10 for each failure to perform such duties. The matter is still hanging fire. Just when it will explode is unknown.

Wake Superior Court in Session—Three Murder Cases.

Judges Peebles convened Wake Superior Court Monday, there being three capital cases scheduled in which the prisoners will be tried for their lives. These are L. J. Norris, formerly of Portsmouth, Va., for the killing of J. B. Bissett; William Beavers, colored, for killing Ed. Pearce, out in the county, and Wiley Austin, for the killing of Warfield Williams, who was in charge of a new church festival and reproved Austin for drunken misbehaviour with the result that Austin shot him to death. Austin, it will be remembered, was captured in Norfolk, Va., some weeks ago by Mr. J. J. Pleasants, of Swift Creek Township. The court is starting out for a two weeks' session.

Ill From Poisoned Bread.

Probably as the result of eating bread made of flour that contained some element of poison, Mrs. Mollie Anderson and Miss Mildred Syme, of East Jones Street, are ill, though it is hoped not seriously. Their cook, who also ate some of the bread, is likewise ill. Monday evening they made up some rolls of water-ground flour and after eating them they became violently ill and sent for a physician. In the meantime a bit of the bread was given the dog, and it, too, became sick.

Some of the bread was sent to the office of the State Chemist, to be analyzed, but the State Chemist preferred to have some of the flour sent.

If obtainable, some of the flour will be sent to Dr. Kilgore to-day, when he will make the analysis to see what it contains in the nature of poison. If some of the flour can be obtained, the bread furnished Tuesday will be analyzed.

New Developments in the State Campaign Against Hookworm Disease.

Dr. John A. Ferrell, in speaking of the progress being made in the campaign for the eradication of the hookworm disease, says:

The State and county dispensaries for the free treatment of hookworm diseases are attracting widespread attention. Fifteen eastern counties have made the necessary provision to have them. In four of these counties—Robeson, Sampson, Columbus and Halifax—the work was completed about three weeks ago, and an average of 3,000 victims of the disease were treated in each county. The counties of Wayne, Onslow, Cumberland and Northampton now have the dispensaries in operation. About one hundred people are being treated daily at each of the dispensaries. Pender, New Hanover, Brunswick, Craven, Pitt, Warren and Hertford Counties have made provision for the dispensaries, and will be entered as soon as possible. Bladen and perhaps two or three other counties will take action the next first Monday. The dispensaries remain in a county usually six weeks. The good results of their work are so apparent that after the dispensaries move to new fields the local doctors are kept busy continuing the treatment.

Engineer H. D. Latham Crushed to Death.

While out with another engine looking for his own, which had been stolen over-night, Engineer H. D. Latham received fatal injuries at Vaughan Monday morning by being caught in a crash between the engine he was using to find his missing locomotive on the lumber road of Greenleaf and Johnson Lumber Company. He died in a Seaboard baggage car near Norlina while being brought to Raleigh. His body was shipped to Williamston for burial.

Fleming Children Turned Over to Wife.

The children of Mr. and Mrs. Perry B. Fleming have been turned over to Mrs. Fleming by Dr. A. H. Fleming, of Louisburg, under order of Judge Peebles. The judge has also ordered that Mr. Fleming shall pay Mrs. Fleming's attorneys and pay her \$75 a month alimony. Mr. Fleming was tried in a justice of the peace court Tuesday on the charge of carrying a concealed weapon. The witnesses stated that the weapon was not concealed and the case was dismissed.

Mails By the Air Route.

First-class mail between London and Windsor is now delivered by flying postmen, five aeroplanes being used. The British postoffice authorities expect to extend the aeroplane mail service greatly soon. Hardly a day passes now that we do not have some fresh triumph of the great invention which we pioneered long without encouragement to record.—Charlotte Observer.
