According to the marriage license statistics gathered from the register of deeds' office 722 marriage licenses have been issued during 1911, 446 white, and 276 colored.

Mr. L. H. Lumsden, who has been chief of the Raleigh Fire Department for the past five years, has resigned and Mr. Walter Woolcott has been elected to succeed him.

Maj. W. A. Graham, commissioner of agriculture, estimates the sale of fertilizer this year at 711,380 tons at a cost of \$15,000,000. At present prices it would require 400,000 bales of cotton to pay for this fertilizer.

L. M. Sandlin, the Wilmington wife murderer, who was to have been electrocuted to-morrow, has been given a respite until December 29th, in order to give his attorneys time to present new evidence which they claim they have.

The bankrupt sale of the personal property of Mr. Percy Fleming Saturday brought \$571. These included household and kitchen effects, but did not include the horse and buggy, surry, watch, billiard table and other articles.

Fifty-nine applicants for license to be pharmacists in North Carolina have been on examination for the past two days in the Hall of the House of Representatives. There are thirteen negroes among the number, and one woman.

During the meeting of the Teachers' Assembly in Raleigh last week the county superintendents of education adopted resolutions endorsing State Superintendent Joyner, and presented him a gold-headed cane as a token of the esteem in which he is held.

Nine negroes, of near Zebulon, were arrested Thursday last for selling liquor, and given a hearing before Mayor G. O. Pitts, of Zebulon, and placed under bonds of \$260 each. Four of them were unable to give bond and were placed in the county jail.

Mr. John W. Farrior, a member of Company A, Forty-third regiment, died at the Soldier's Home last Saturday, at the age of sixty-five years. He was a native of Duplin county, and his remains were taken to Kenansville for interment. He entered the Home January, 1910.

Charley Houtson and Will Boyd, convicted in Mecklenburg County in 1910 of manslaughter, and sentenced to four years on the roads, were granted conditional pardons yesterday by Governor Kitchin. The solicitor and attorney believe that a third party did the killing.

Mr. Russel Ferrell, son of Mr. W. J. Ferrell, narrowly escaped asphyxiation and drowning Friday night in falling to turn off the gas from an instantaneous heater in the bathroom of his home. He was found by his mother in an unconscious condition, with his head in the bath tub.

Three pardons and one commutation were granted Tuesday by the Governor: Dolph Jones, of McDowell County; Dan Rogers, of Durham County, and Gudger Finley, of McDowell County, pardoned, and the sentence of Paul Killman, of Buncombe County, commuted to a fine of \$500.

A new enterprise in Raleigh is the Southern Cotton Harvester Company, to manufacture, sell and deal in cotton harvesters and other machinery, etc., authorized capital \$200,000, divided into shares of \$10 each, with \$5,000 paid in advance by C. N. Goodwin, B. R. Jolly, A. W. Goodwin and M. Ashby Lambert.

Mrs. Spier Whitaker Dead. Mrs. Spier Whitaker, wife of the late Judge Spier Whitaker of Raleigh, died a few days ago at Birmingham, Ala. The remains were brought to Raleigh for interment.

Cotton Weighers Reappointed. The Wake Board of County Commissioners, at the first meeting of the new fiscal year Monday, re-elected the former cotton weighers, John Stephens, W. A. Pulley and W. J. Carlton. W. F. Jones was re-elected constable in charge of the grand jury. E. L. Shepherd was re-appointed janitor of the court-house. A. J. Stephens qualified as constable of Holly Springs Township and C. J. Harward as constable of Leesville Township.

Mrs. Walter Womble Dead. Mrs. Mary Watkins Womble, wife of Mr. Walter Womble, died early Saturday morning at her home on East Hargett street. She was stricken with an attack of appendicitis the latter part of July which resulted in a complication of diseases and she had suffered incessantly since that time.

She was the daughter Thomas W. Watkins, of Warren county, and was thirty-three years of age. The funeral services were held from the Tabernacle Church Monday afternoon, conducted by the new pastor, Er. C. E. Maddrey.

Baptists in Convention at Winston-Salem.

The eighty-first session of the Baptist State Convention convened in Winston-Salem, Tuesday night in the Brown Memorial church. Rev. C. H. Durham, of Lumberton, was elected President by unanimous vote to succeed Mr. W. C. Dowd, of Charlotte. Rev. W. R. L. Smith, pastor of the Baptist church at Chapel Hill, preached the opening sermon to a very large congregation. His chosen theme was "The Sufficiency of God in All the Trials and Needs of Human Life." From the reports received, all the various departments of the church have advanced by leaps and bounds. A large amount of work has been completed which was begun last year, and all debts have been paid.
