Local Matters.

Dr. A. T. Hadley, President of Yale University, will deliver the Mc-Nair lectures at Chapel Hill Friday and Saturday nights, next.

Mrs. Julia Harrison Hicks, widow of the late Col. W. J. Hicks, long superintendent of the Orphanage at Oxford, died in Raleigh last week at the age of eighty-five.

Mrs. C. L. Guthrie and son, C. L. Lehman, left for New York Tuesday where they went on account of the sinking of the Titanic. Mrs. Guthrie had two sisters on the ill-fated vessel.

The Mecklenburg tablet, commemorating the famous Mecklenburg declaration of Independence, arrived in the city yesterday and is now ready to be placed in the rotunda of the capitol.

Hon. C. B. Watson, of Winston-Salem, declared Tuesday that he leans toward Chief Justice Walter Clark in spite of some of the planks in the Judge's platform. Mr. Watson was a supporter of Governor Aycock.

Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, who has accepted an invitation to speak in Greensboro next Monday, may come to Raleigh and deliver a speech here. Efforts are being made to secure an appointment from him.

A young man named Frank Bundy, of Jamestown, came to Raleigh Friday to take the Pasteur treatment for a mad dog bite. The young man is fifteen years of age, and was bitten on the little finger by his pet dog.

Adjutant-General Leinster has received one thousand injections of typhoid vaccine to be distributed among the members of the North Carolina National Guard. Eleven hundred treatments were received and distributed last summer.

WAKE COUNTY REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

Will Be Held in Raleigh Tuesday April 23—Primaries on Saturday the 20th.

It is further ordered that the primaries in the various precincts in the county be held on Saturday, April 20th, to select delegates to said County Convention, the primaries in Raleigh Township to be held at 8 o'clock P. M.

HISTORIES ADOPTED.

State Text-Book Commission Ends Work One Old Book Retained and Another Dropped.

The State Text-Book Commission, in session Tuesday, adopted United States histories for use in the public schools for the next five years. White's "Beginner's History of the United States," published by the American Book Company, was re-adopted and "Our History," by Riley, Chandler & Hamilton, replaced Chambers' history. "Our History" is published by the Thompson Publishing Company of Raleigh and one of its authors, Dr. Hamilton, is Professor of History in the University of North Carolina. Chambers' history had been used for a score or more of years.

The Text-Book Commission and the Sub-Commission met last summer and adopted all the school books except histories.

JOHNSTON COUNTY MAN CHARGED WITH MISTREATING HIS WIFE.

W. J. Adams of Benson Cited to Appear Before Judge Webb at Goldsboro in Answer to Driving Wife From Home.

That W. J. Adams, of Benson, Johnston County, mistreated and drove from the house the mother and babe apart are the allegations set up in a petition presented before Justice W. R. Allen, of the North Carolina Supreme Court today by Mr. J. R. Barbour, attorney for Mrs. Adams, asking that a writ of habeas corpus be served on the husband. Justice Allen issued the writ and made it returnable before Judge Jas. L. Webb at Goldsboro, immediately.

Mr. Barbour came to Raleigh yesterday on his mission. Mrs. Adams asserts in her petition that this was not the first time she had been badly treated by a brutal husband, and that on former occasions he had mistreated her. On the occasion of which the petition deals, she alleges that he came home, abused and mistreated her, finally driving her from the house. He kept the three-week-old babe and refuses to allow its mother to have it.

Judge Webb will hear the matter as soon as he receives the writ, which will probably be today in Goldsboro. —Raleigh Times.

To the Editor:—If you will permit me space in your valuable paper, I would just speak a few words to the Republicans of Wake County in regard to the would-be fight now pending.

Fellow Republicans, the fight has narrowed down to one of two things, viz: do we want to return to the old order of things or do we wish to keep up the good work the party is doing by holding on to our present State and county organization. Numerous and varied are the accusations brought against our county chairman and fellow workers by the crowd that wishes to regain control of our party government to use it for their own personal advantages. By chance I was handed one of Mr. Andrew's letters that was supposed to be such a shrewd political move? I read the letter carefully and find it to be absolutely without any foundation upon which to stand. He claims his right to govern our party in Wake County upon the ground that the last State Convention recognized him as a delegate, even though he was a rump delegate, never telling you that the credential committee was a packed one, full of Duncan men. Then I would like to ask why is he serving a master that could only give him six votes when they had it in their power to give him all? The one thing in particular in his letter I wish to dispute is his reference to our county chairman's own precinct. His exact words are: "Of those present in this precinct delegation in the County Convention a decided majority were against your faction (the names could be given, but they are well known to you.) Yet the vote of that precinct was erroneously given in and recorded in favor of your faction."

Now, Mr. Andrews, and even Willis Briggs know this to be absolutely false. I was living in this precinct at that time and know the conditions that existed. There was a gentleman that lived at the Pilot Mill by the name of A. E. Oglesby, a Democrat, and a frequent contributor to The Evening Times, fighting for what is known as the Buck Jones wing of the Democratic party. Willis Briggs sent Mr. Oglesby to our primary with a type list of delegates that Mr. Oglesby said Mr. Briggs wanted to come to the County Convention. Mr. Oglesby made the above statement in the presence of myself and several others, so you see the method they used should be beneath the notice of our Republicans in the county. We gave them two delegates or 2-7 of a vote and then instructed them, the men being J. J. Wilson and J. J. Phillips, the latter to whom they had promised a post-office, works at Pilot Mills. THE HOOKWORM DISPENSARIES.

Examinations Will be Made and Treatment Given at Four Different Points in Wake County—The Progress of the Campaign.

At last Wake County is to have the campaign for the eradication of hookworm disease.

Dr. C. L. Pridgen, of the State Board of Health, assisted by Mrs. Pridgen, will be in charge of this work and will establish dispensaries at five different points in the county which are given below.

Hookworm disease has been found very prevalent in North Carolina, and its ravages among the rural population are beyond words to describe. In the eastern portion of the State where most of the work has been done up to this time, eighty thousand people have been examined and over sixty thousand of these have been found to be infected and have been treated with marvelous results. The authorities of a number of counties where the work has been done realizing what it has meant for their people have requested the Board to have additional work done there for which they are willing to appropriate funds, but this has been refused until every county in the State can have its chance.

It has been by far the most popular health work ever attempted and the masses of the people have been enthusiastic and have gone out in large crowds to the dispensaries seeking examination and treatment.

In New Hanover County four thousand people were examined, over four thousand were examined in Beaufort County, five thousand were examined in Pender, six thousand in Columbus and nearly eight thousand in Onslow County, etc.

Over-half of all those examined were found infected and were given treatment by Dr. Pridgen. In one place some of the more severely infected cases dropped by the roadside and were picked up by others and brought to the dispensary for treatment, and one gentleman observing such incidents, remarked that he had not seen or heard of anything like it since reading of the days of Gatties.

The county of Wake and the State Board of Health having investigated this work, and having the good of the masses at heart, have arranged to bring these dispensaries almost to the doors of the citizens of Wake County so that they may have examination and treatment free of any cost.

It then becomes the duty of every good citizen while these dispensaries are here to have himself and family examined because only by examination with the microscope can it be positively found whether there is or is not infection. It has been found that the greater number of cases are obtained through ground itch, dew poison, etc., but it has also been determined that a large number of cases are infected through foods such as tomatoes, lettuce, celery, radishes, cabbage, strawberries, and fruits. No class, conditions or race is im-

mune to this infection. It is widespread through all, but is found mostly in the rural sections where the earth is turned by the plow and is loose or moist.

It is expected that five thousand people will visit the dispensaries and be examined.

Exhibits will be on display there and lectures on hookworm and sanitation will be given daily.

Everyone will be allowed to use the microscope and diagnose their own case. Illustrated literature on different diseases will be given out free of charge.

Tom Moxley Gets Two Years for Killing Mitchell Wilson; Connet Brothers to Serve 10 Years for Murder.

Winston-Salem, N. C., April—In Alleghany court, Judge Daniels presiding, Tom Moxley was convicted of killing Mitchell Wilson, and the defendant was sentenced to the State Prison for a term of two years.
