Local Matters.

Wake County made 46,000 bales of cotton this season, and led Wayne, which stands second in the point of production, over 1,000 bales.

Governor Kitchin has ordered a special term of civil court for Washington County, to begin June 24th, and continue for two weeks, with Judge G. S. Ferguson presiding.

Mr. H. S. Fairbanks, from the Bureau of Roads, United States Department of Agriculture, was in the city Tuesday, and inspected over fifty miles of road in Wake County.

In the case of J. A. Tant vs. Norfolk Southern Railroad, which was tried in the Wake Superior Court last week, the jury rendered a verdict awarding the plaintiff damage to the sum of \$2,500.

Reuben Combs, who escaped from the State's Prison March 25th, was captured in Franklin Saturday and brought back to Raleigh. He was sentenced for a term of thirty years from Iredell County for killing his wife.

Mr. H. L. Church, a prominent young man of Goldsboro, his little daughter and little Richard Pearsal, also of Goldsboro, have arrived in the city to take the Pasteur treatment for the bite of a rabid dog during the past week.

Comrade William Spence died Sunday afternoon at the Soldiers' Home and his remains were taken to Dunn for burial. He was eighty-five years of age, and came to the Home from Harnett County. He was a member of Company I, Thirty-first Regiment.

The Chamber of Commerce has issued ten thousand copies of a booklet which contains important information for delegates and other visitors to Raleigh. Copies of this booklet will be given all the delegates to all the conventions here this year.

Governor Kitchin on last Saturday granted pardons to Ila Harris, who was convicted in the Recorder's court of Stanly County last February of assault and affray; also to Primus Chambliss, convicted in Northampton County, in August, 1911, of larceny, and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.

Death of Mr. William E. Monor.

Mr. William E. Monor, of Harrisonburg, Va., formerly of Raleigh, died suddenly at his home in Harrisonburg, Tuesday. He was fifty-one years old. His wife, who was Miss Blanche Blake, of Raleigh, with two children, survive him.

Mr. William E. Marshall Dead.

Mr. William E. Marshall, son of Mr. W. F. Marshall, died in Birmingham, Ala., Monday afternoon of typhoid fever, and his remains were brought to the city yesterday. The funeral services were conducted from the First Baptist Church at 3:30 and the interment was in Oakwood Cemetery.

Mr. Marshall was twenty-four years of age, was born and reared in Gastonia, N. C., and moved with father to Raleigh a few years ago.

THE WAKE PRIMARY LAW.

Primary Will Be Held the First Saturday in June.

As the readers of The Caucasian will remember, the Democratic members of the Legislature two years ago succeeded in having a legalized primary law passed to apply only to Wake County, providing for both parties to go into the same primary to choose their candidates, committees, etc. Some few Republicans have expressed a willingness to go into the primary while many are opposed to participating in the primary and favor, holding a mass meeting and endorsing candidates independent of the primary. The following from the Raleigh Times gives the most important features of the primary law: "With the election of Mr. Percy J. Olive a chairman of the Wake County Democratic Executive Committee and the announcement of several candidates for the Legislature, interest in the primary election to be held in Wake County one month from tomorrow has increased. From a careful reading of the primary act it is seen that only legislative and State officers are nominated in June, the county or court-house officers being nominated in August. "Both political parties must nominate officers in these primaries. The principal features of the act follows: "The Two Primaries. "Section 2. All nominations for State offices, members of Congress, judicial offices and solicitor and members of the General Assembly, and all elections of delegates to county conventions and precinct committees shall be determined at a primary to be held on the first Saturday in June preceding the general election for said offices, respectively. "Sec. 3. All nominations for county and township officers shall be made the last Saturday in August preceding the general election for said offices."

Free School System Now Conducted as a Part of the Democratic Machine. (Justice, in Union Republican.) Mr. Editor:—In last week's issue of The Republican some one signing himself "The Truth" takes up what I said a few issues back in illustrating the fact that our free school system is nothing more nor less than a part of the Democratic machine. He says: "Every district in Abbott's Creek Township has at least one committeeman who has children of school age that went to school last winter." My information is that in District No. 2, of Abbott's Creek that Julius Stafford, Garfield Marshall and Armenius McKaughn comprise the school committee. Julius Stafford has no children of school age, Armenius McKaughn lives in the Macey Grove District and Garfield Marshall has one child some six or seven years old. Thus in order to get all Democrats, if my information is correct, the School Board actually went outside of the district and appointed Mr. McKaughn, there being only three straight Democrats in that district, as follows: Julius Stafford, his son Harvey Stafford, and Garfield Marshall. If this is not correct, let the party signing himself "The Truth" correct it.

But if this is not to keep the schools in the hands of the Democrats, why not appoint three Republicans who patronize this school as its committee, such men as Dug. Shields, who sends five or six children to this school? Again, if this is not done to help the Democratic machine, I would ask why was Mr. Joe Phipps dropped from the school committee and a Democrat put in his place? Again, I would ask if there is no politics in the schools, why Miss Cora Shields, who is the daughter of a Republican, was given this school last year when Mr. Joe Phipps, a Republican, was one of the trustees and the school was given to Victor Hedgecock, a Democrat, this year, after Mr. Phipps had been dropped from the committee? When your correspondent has answered and explained the above questions and conditions, then it will be time enough to notice the other matters mentioned in his letter.
