Local Matters.

Last week forty-five new cases of measles were reported to the Raleigh Health Department.

Florence Jones, who was accused of selling whiskey in Raleigh, has been sentenced to a term of a year. She appealed and had her bond placed at \$500.

Mr. J. B. Ellis, of St. Matthews township, died Saturday night of pneumonia at the age of 34 years. He is survived by a wife and three children.

There have been 500 cases of grip among the patients of the Insane Asylum at Raleigh this winter. This was nearly half of the number in the asylum.

In Wake Court a few days ago Walter G. Ferrebee, who lost a hand and was otherwise injured while in the service of the Norfolk Southern Railroad was awarded \$10,000 damages.

H. D. Bateman, of Greenville, N. C., has been appointed assistant State Bank Examiner to succeed L. F. Covington, who resigned to accept the vice-presidency of the Anchor Trust Company of this city.

Engineer Seward Gets \$500.

Engineer R. H. Seward, whose suit against the Seaboard Air Line for damages growing out of the publication of his record as an engineer, which was thrown out of court in the spring, Tuesday received an award of \$500.

Mr. Seward asked for \$30,000. It was the same amount for which he sued last year. After hearing the testimony in the first case, the presiding judge threw the litigation out and Mr. Seward appealed to the Supreme Court. That tribunal said that his case should have been permitted to go to the jury.

Zeb Vance Johnson of Cary Dies Suddenly.

Acute indigestion resulting, it is said, from eating stewed oysters, caused the death of Zeb Vance Johnson Sunday afternoon at his home in Cary, about eight miles west of Raleigh. He was found unconscious in his stable lot, where he had gone to milk. He was about 55 years of age and leaves a widow and one son, A. S. Johnson.

Saturday night Mr. Johnson attended a banquet given at the Walker hotel by the Cary division of the Patriotic Sons of America, and partook, it is said, very freely of stewed oysters. He awoke the following morning with a complaint of not feeling exactly right, but never gave his slight illness any serious thought. With the advancement of the day his illness was plainer, but still there was no alarm. At 5 o'clock Mr. Johnson went, as usual, to the barnyard to do his regular duties and it is thought that while doing the milking he was stricken with the fatal attack. When found he was lying on his side near the partially filled milk pail.

Mr. Johnson had been living in Cary for a number of years and with his son conducted an undertaking and manufacturing business. He was a member of the Odd Fellows, Juniors and Patriotic Sons of America. —From Tuesday's News and Observer.

CARNATIONS \$51.00 A BUNCH.

How the Democrats Are Using the Young Boys and Girls to Try to Make a Showing for Them in School Matters.

There seems to be an effort on the part of the Democrats to brag about what they have done for schools in North Carolina. Every few days the News and Observer states that a certain school in Wake County has raised a certain amount of money which will lengthen the school term, etc.

True, some money is being raised, but the Democrats are not doing it. If the schools were to cut out the box parties, cake contests, oyster suppers and school farms and special taxes, many of them would not have enough money from the State and county to run a three months' school term. The way the money for the schools is raised in more or less a hold-up game. At one school in Wake a few days ago a bunch of carnations sold for \$51. The box parties are along the same line. The oyster suppers are not quite as much a hold-up, but in some cases they made the people desperately ill and came near costing several lives, all for the sake of trying to help the Democratic party make a decent showing in school. The school farms are no help. The same time spent at work at home would prove more valuable. If all this petty graft was cut out the Democrats would not make as good showing in the matter of schools as was made fifteen years ago, when the schools were not costing the taxpayers of the State half what they are to-day.

Brother and Sister Die Same Day.

Little Julia Carpenter and her two-months-old brother, children of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Carpenter, of Raleigh, died a few days ago from pneumonia following an attack of measles. Both children were buried the same day.

MANY RAILROAD MEN HERE

For Conference With Governor and Legislative Committee as to the Freight Rates.

Representatives of all the railroads doing business in this State are in Raleigh for conference with Governor Craig and the legislative committee as to the freight rate in North Carolina and from other points to points in this State. Nothing yet has been given out from the meeting.

FIGHT IN THE HOUSE.

Member of the Legislature From Currituck Assaulted by E. R. Johnson, Who Was Later Arrested.

A fight in the legislative halls Monday evening created some excitement for the time being. Representative S. J. Payne, of Currituck, was assaulted by Mr. E. R. Johnson, a merchant from the same county. This writer was not present at the time but the special correspondent of the Greensboro News gives the following account of the fight and its sequel:

"Representative Long called the attention of the members of the House to the fact that in the early evening Representative S. J. Payne, of Currituck County, was assaulted by E. R. Johnson, a well known merchant of Currituck County, and his eye and nose much disfigured by a blow dealt him. He offered a resolution that Johnson be arrested by the sergeant-at-arms and brought before the bar of the house for punishment for wanton and malicious assault upon the gentleman from Currituck. "It was explained that Mr. Payne had introduced a bill to increase the membership of the Currituck Board of Education from three to five, and Johnson was here opposing the bill; that Johnson approached Payne in the corridor of the capitol, when a heated argument arose, in which Johnson accused Payne of bad faith and misrepresenting his constituents and being really a Republican. Payne replied that 400 citizens were asking the change along with two of the three members of the present board. Johnson applied the 'lie.' Payne replied that he was not out calling people liars, but that Johnson knew he was telling what was false, and turned away. As he did so Johnson struck him a glancing blow on the brow, eye and nose. This was the case as stated by Payne to friends.

"Representative Long informed the House that Johnson was leaving on the 5:15 Norfolk Southern train for home, and the resolution passed directing the Speaker to issue his warrant and have Johnson taken in custody before he could get off on the train. It was then 9 o'clock. By 9:30 Johnson was brought into the hall and the resolution read to him. He made answer, admitted the attack on Payne, but denied the manner of assault or that it was wanton or malicious. Speaker Connor named a committee of three, Representatives Long of Alamance, Droughton of Alleghany and Devin of Granville, to investigate and report as early as possible. The committee retired and the investigation required a couple of hours.

"At 11 o'clock the committee reported that they found the case to be not one showing contempt, such as the House should take further notice of; that neither the House nor any committee was in session at the time of the assault, and that in the opinion of the committee no further action should be taken.

"Mr. Johnson was discharged. He was a member of the Senate from Currituck County in 1909."
