the voters of the city that it shall be, by them, given authority to issue coupon bonds of the city, to be known as the Water Bonds of the City of Charlotte, to an amount not to exceed \$300,000,00, said bonds to bear interest at a rate not to exceed 5 per cent. per annum, to be of the denomination of \$1,000 or \$500 as may best suit the purchaser thereof' to run for 30 years, and the semi-annual interest thereon and the principal thereof to be paid when due at such place as may be designated in the said bonds, which shall be in the usual form of such municipal obligations, and shall be sold for not less than par, and the proceeds applied to the purposes aforesaid.
