This includes the 19th annual report of the director of the station, and the various bulletins that were issued during the year, of which there were fifty-five, all on subjects of more or less interest and importance to agriculturists, Director Battle and his associates have brought the station to a high degree of efficiency, have placed it in the front rank of such institutions in this country, and, as is attested by various letters from experts, made it the equal of the agricultural stations

of Europe. The station is now in new and untried hands. And it is doubtful if its high state of efficiency will be maintained.




