

The board of county commissioners met again yesterday, present chairman Ardrey, and commissioners Oates, Whitley, Morris and Brown. The minutes of the previous day's session were read and approved and the following business was transacted:

It was ordered by the board that the county treasurer transfer \$10.48 from school district 38 to 37, colored race, Dewese township, the same being the amount due by apportionment of 1882, a part of No 38 having been cut off and added to district 37.
