Whitney, representing Charles Morgan, bid two million and fifty thousand, at which amount it was knocked down after a moment's pause, and \$75,000 was immediately paid as a guarantee. Mr. Whitney announced that it was the intention of Mr. Morgan, who himself was present, to immediately set about extending the road to the Sabine. The actual sale occupied barely ten minutes.
