The Jones County Tragedy.

The Sheriff of Jones County has been killed, by one of more parties unknown. The deed was committed by parties in concealment, within a mile or so of this house of the murdered man, and but few traces have been left by the perpetrators.

Colgrove has fallen, and by the hands of an assassin. It is useless in this community or in any other, where the editors of this journal are known, for us to state that we have no sympathy for the criminals who, under cover, committed the deed; but we cannot hesitate to express the belief that the conduct of this man was so outrageous as to leave but little chance for him to have met other than a violent death.

Colgrove is charged with having been the seducer of a young school mistress, George Nason, Jr., editor and publisher of the Newbern Times, investigated this matter. He is charged with attempting a vile outrage, more recently, upon the person of a married woman; he is charged with tyrannical and most oppressive conduct in the discharge of his official duties—his rudeness and overbearing deportment have made hundreds of enemies where he had not a single friend before, and doubtless hastened his death.

While we may depise the assassin, we cannot eulogise or praise the victim; and it is consistent to denounce the crime and the criminal and, at the same time, avow the belief that the judgment of God had been visited upon the slain.—*Journal of Com.*

AFFAIRS IN JONES.—The latest intelligence from Jones county contradicts the reports published yesterday, and represents affairs there as quiet. No one had been murdered since the killing of Colgrove; though incendiaries have not been idle. Besides the house of Mr. Haswell, the gin house of Mr. Shade Loftin and the smoke house of a widow lady whose name we did not learn, have also been destroyed. These were the acts of negroes.—*Ibid.*

Ordinance.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE FOLLOWING City Ordinance, which will be RIGIDLY ENFORCED, in order that the health of the City may be insured:

Be it ordained, That any person or persons who shall deposit in any of the streets any rubbish, refuse, or filth of any kind whatever, to remain in any street or lot, or suffer any person or persons to do so, shall be liable to a fine of Five Dollars. And any person or persons who shall suffer his or her or their chips, wood, boxes, hogheads, bales, or anything (material for building excepted) calculated to obstruct the free passage of the streets, sidewalks, or water in the gutters, to remain in the said streets, walks, or gutters, longer than forty-eight hours, shall forfeit and pay for each and every offence the sum of Two Dollars, and One Dollar for every day said obstructions remain.

Be it further ordained, That any person or persons who shall deposit the carcass of any dead animal in any street or lot, or suffer such to remain there, within the limits of the town, shall forfeit and pay for each and every offence the sum of Five Dollars.

Be it further ordained, That no one occupying any house in the City shall suffer any water to remain in his or her cellar, or on their lots, so as to become stagnant, under a penalty of Five Dollars; and the further penalty of One Dollar for every day such nuisance is suffered to remain.

Affairs in Washington.

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Pennsylvania claims that cigars manufactured by convicts should be exempt from taxation. The claim will be rejected on the ground that convicts might make whiskey.

Revenue to-day \$897,000. The Evening Star says the Secretary of War has communicated to the President of the New Orleans Chamber of Commerce the perfect harmony of the Government with the wishes of the Commercial Convention respecting the improvements of the Mississippi.

Total debt, principal and interest, \$2,633,670,653.40. Amount in the Treasury: coin belonging to the Government, \$81,839,469.49. Coin for which certificates of deposit are outstanding, \$23,340,720.00. Currency, \$19,984,552.07. Sinking fund in bonds, bearing 4 1/2 per cent, and accrued interest thereon, \$5,093,295.42. Total \$128,258,039.98.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—Letters from Cuba received here this morning, state the force under General Jordan had succeeded in joining the Cuban forces after several fights in all of which the Spaniards were repulsed with serious loss.

General Jordan's loss was slight—not over forty-five killed and wounded. He saved his artillery and arms and ammunition. He had with him seventeen hundred rifles, new and of the most approved pattern.

Foreign News.

LONDON, June 3.—The Alabama diplomatic correspondence is published, commenting on which the Times says: "When we compare the exacting and critical spirit of America with the conceding temper of England, and consider that all that was yielded was insufficient to prevent the rejection of the treaty, we despair of the success of any negotiations in which England maintains due regard for her own rights and honor."

HAVANA, June 3.—The agitation in the city has partially abated. Dulce resigned this morning Don Espinor is acting Captain General until the arrival of De Roda.

The city is tranquil but disorder threatens to break out at any moment, as the volunteers are greatly incensed against General Pelenz, who has disappeared, whereabouts unknown. Great anxiety prevails. The Vascos volunteers arrived in part to-day.

MADRID, June 3.—The Cortes has adopted the Constitution. Teop informed the Cortes that six hundred Cuban prisoners had been sent to Fernando, and are soon to be transferred to the Canaries.

A motion, reducing the standing army to 25,000, was lost. General O'Connell, while speaking against the motion, was seized with apoplexy and died in the Chamber.

Figurings announced that, though opposed to monarchy, the Republicans would support and follow the Constitution. [Special dispatch to the Standard.]

Consolidation Mass Meeting at New Bern.

NEW BERNE, June 2.—At three o'clock to-day about three thousand persons assembled on the Academy Green, to listen to speeches relating to the consolidation of the Atlantic and North Carolina and the North Carolina Railroads, under the following motto: "Consolidation, union of the East and West, North Carolina forever."

Able addresses were delivered by M. E. Manly, A. S. Seymour, W. H. Malone, Dr. M. E. Arndt and J. H. Houghton. All the speakers were in favor of consolidation.

The New Bern brass band was in attendance and opened fluently with the soul-stirring music, "Old North State."

The square will be illuminated to-night, and more speeches will be made. Great enthusiasm prevails. We are the guests of the Hon. Ed. B. Splanly, President of the Atlantic and North Carolina Railroad. Most of the guests (this morning went upon an excursion down the river some twenty miles on the steamer, Ellen S. Terry.

So far all has passed as merry as a marriage bell. No news from Jones county. To-morrow we go to Morehead City and Beaufort.

Scene in the Cage of an Enraged Lion.

An incident occurred at the circus, corner of Bourbon and Orleans streets, (says the New Orleans Picayune) which nearly became a tragedy. It is well known to our people that Herr Lingel, the lion-tamer, at the close of the performance, enters the cage of the lions. For more than a year the lioness has made a great antipathy to him; has more than once attacked him with savage ferocity.

At Madison, Indiana, last summer, she came very near killing him, and as it still remembering the advantage then, obtained, she made a similar attack, which came near being fatal. For some time before entering the dens, they discovered great uneasiness, and when the lion-tamer mounted the ladder which led into the cage, the lioness assumed a position which threatened an immediate attack.
