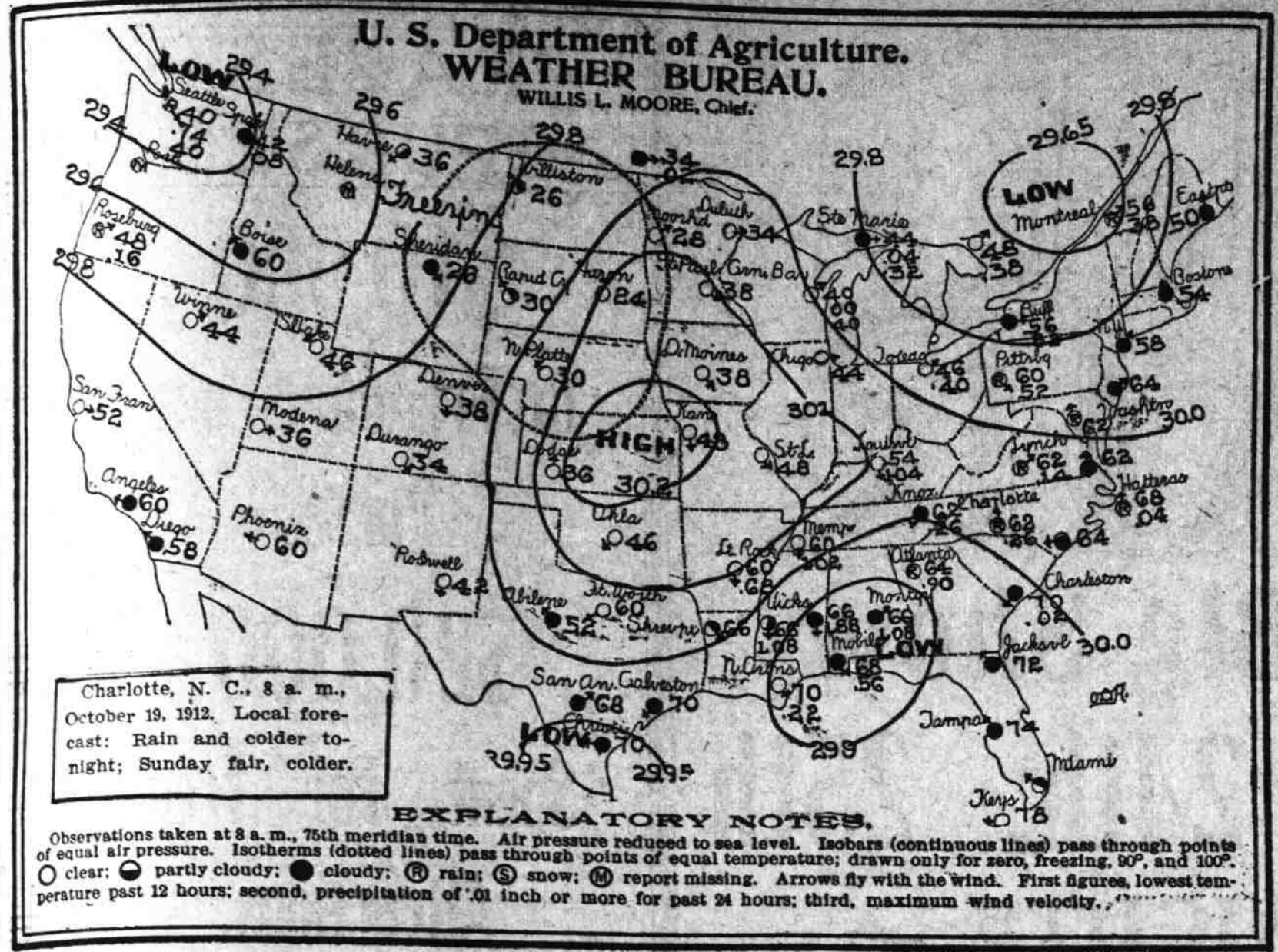


WEATHER CONDITIONS AT 8 A. M.

Forecast for North Carolina: Rain tonight, colder west and south portions; Sunday, colder and generally fair. Moderate variable winds.

EXPLANATION OF TODAY'S MAP.

The low pressure area, which will be seen central over southern Alabama, has developed in the past 24 hours. It has caused heavy rainfall over the whole of Alabama and Georgia and general rains from the Gulf to the lake region. The high area which was over the north Pacific States on Friday has moved rapidly eastward, appearing centrally over Kansas today. It is being preceded by clearing and decidedly colder weather. A considerable area over the Northern Plains States is enclosed by the "freezing" line. The indications are for continued rain in this vicinity with colder nights; Sunday fair and colder.

HUNDREDS OF TAXPAYERS FAILED TO MAKE RETURNS

There is a decrease of 761 in the number of taxpayers in the office of Sheriff N. W. Wallace as shown by the books just completed for the new tax year as compared with the same for the year preceding. Just how to account for these variations in the total number of tax returns which the sheriff's office makes out from year to year in anticipation of the payment of taxes by all those in the sheriff's bailwick, which in this instance includes only Charlotte Township, is a question as yet unanswered. It is suggested that many polls in the township escape the tax listers from time to time, and it is known that by making special effort several hundred polls that have not been returned can be discovered at any time the work is undertaken. The figures for this year, showing the total number of tax receipts ready to be turned over to taxpayers when they settle their State and county taxes with the sheriff, is 7,824. Last year the number was 8,585, which indicates a decrease or falling off of 761 taxpayers.

BUILDINGS AT THE FAIR GROUNDS ARE COMPLETED

The buildings at the fair grounds are ready to receive the exhibits, it is said, and the grading and rolling of the track has been completed. The officers of the Charlotte Fair Association are rejoicing in the fact that the big undertaking planned for this year has reached the point where they can say they are prepared with the new buildings in the new grounds to give the best stock show and the best agricultural exhibit that has ever been presented to the public in this county. The managers of the new association have planned the new grounds and the buildings it contains with a view to building up an interest among the people in those things which concern the farm. It is intended that the Charlotte fair shall be something more than a big show and frolic; it will be all that and more.

The new association has been exceedingly fortunate in the location of the grounds, for it occupies a very attractive position, lying right alongside of the electric railroad, and on an elevation which overlooks the most picturesque part of Lakewood Park. A special road has been built leading from the wagon gate opening into the grounds to the Tuckasegee macadam highway, giving to each one an easy opportunity to get into the grounds. The convenient manner in which the entire plant has been laid out indicates that the master hand has been at work, everything shows that completeness of detail which is often lacking where such work is left to the novice. When the people of the county see the new fair grounds plant they are going to feel proud of it and will want to help make the annual fair what it should be.
