BOOKS TO CLOSE NEXT SATURDAY

A Short Time Left Now For Voters To Get Their Names Properly Registered

THE REGISTRATION PLACES BOUNDED

Description of Bounds of Voting Precincts, Names of Registrars and Location of Books Published to Remove Confusion—Voters Should Be Certain That Their Names Are on the Right Books—No Registration After Saturday Evening at Sunset.

On account of the very large number of voters in the city who are not properly registered for the approaching election and because of some confusion regarding the location of the places for registration and the bounds of the several voting precincts, The Chronicle is presenting today a description of each precinct with the place of registration. It is estimated that there are something like 2,000 voters in the city and county who have not qualified to vote by registering and probably 1,200 or more of these are in the city and Charlotte township.

County Chairman W. F. Harding has made another discovery. Hundreds of persons registered by mistake on the general election books for the primary of last May and are now serenely fancying themselves qualified to vote November 5. They are mistaken. It was through an error in the office of register of deeds that the general registration books were distributed throughout the county on that occasion.

Persons who registered in the precinct in which they now reside either at a general election two, four or more years ago, need not again do so.

Mr. Harding has secured the names of 200 Democrats in the city who registered in May and who must re-register and he will notify these individually. Forty were found in one ward. At one voting place the registrar himself was not legally registered and would have been unable to vote if challenged.

All persons who have moved into another precinct, or who have come from another county or State, and all persons who have come of age since the last general election two years ago will be required to register. The bounds of the several precincts in

Charlotte and Charlotte township, the name of the election officials and the location of the registration books are as follows:
