BAPTISTS GATHER FOR ANNUAL MEET
North Carolina Convention To Be Held In First Church At Goldsboro

Baptist ministers of Charlotte will leave tonight for Goldsboro to attend the annual Convention which will begin its sessions tomorrow morning, continuing until Friday. This is the highest official body of the Baptists in North Carolina, corresponding to the Synods and Assemblies of the Presbyterians and the Conferences of the Methodists.

The opening session of the Convention is to be held, Tuesday night and the annual sermon is to be preached by Rev. C. Q. Davis of Windsor, or his alternate, Rev. J. Clyde Turner of Greensboro. Immediately following the sermon, the president of the Convention, Rev. C. H. Durham of Lumberton, will call the annual meeting to order, and the organization will be effected. It is generally understood that the old officers of the body will be re-elected. They are: President, Rev. C. H. Durham, Lumberton; vice president, A. I. Justice, Hendersonville; C. W. Scarborough, Woodland; G. T. Stephenson, Winston-Salem; recording secretaries, N. E. Broughton, Raleigh, and C. E. Brewer, Wake Forest; treasurer, Walters Durham, Raleigh; auditor, F. H. Briggs, Raleigh; corresponding secretary, Livingston Johnson, Raleigh; trustees, W. C. Tyree, High Point; D. S. Pace, Hendersonville; Nath Biggs, Scotland Neck; W. N. Jones, Raleigh, and D. E. Gora, Wilmington.

Considerable interest attaches to the annual report of the board of state missions. The work of this board reaches every section of the state, and is being enlarged every year. This year it seems almost inevitable that the board will have to report a small deficit, but the actual facts will hardly be known until the books are closed Monday. Next in importance will be the consideration of a resolution to be presented by Rev. W. C. Barrett of Gastonia. This resolution is to provide for a closer connection between the Baptist denomination in the State and the educational institutions.

At the present time Wake Forest College, Meredith College and the Thomasville Orphanage, while in trust institutions belonging to and supported by the Baptist of North Carolina, are directly managed by boards of trustees that are self-perpetuating. This fact has aroused some comment and the purpose of the resolution of Mr. Barrett is to change the method of selecting the members of these boards.

There has already developed some opposition to any change in the present method of selecting the managing boards, and the consideration of the entire question promises to be interesting.

The coming session of the Baptist State Convention in Goldsboro recalls other gatherings of the same body of people in that town. Four other meetings of the Baptists of the old North State have been held there. The annual meeting of 1860 was held in Goldsboro, and the presiding officer was Elder James McDaniel; the recording secretary was Rev. W. T. Brooks; corresponding secretary, Rev. E. F. Marable; treasurer, S. S. Biddle, and the annual sermon was delivered by Rev. H. Petty. The Convention at that session listened with pleasure to Rev. T. E. Skinner, the field agent of the Raleigh Female Seminary, and an offering of \$2,200 was made that educational institution. The Baptists of that period were giving considerable attention to colportage work.
