

Afternoons Are Gradually Lengthening Out, Making Up For Deficiency

According to the figures furnished scientifically-inclined government through Local Forecaster O. O. ring to his tables, will answer that from December 15 or 16, the difference in the length of the day is almost without variation until several days after Christmas, the mornings growing shorter and the afternoons growing longer.

Thes shortest afternoon in this lat-Itude lasts 5 hours and 11 minutes and this is the case usually on December 1 or 2, after which the lengthening process begins, although there is not over 4 minutes increase during the first 20 days of December. The morning, however, during December begins begin with a length of 5 hours and 47 minutes and continue to shorten until January 2 or 3, when they are only 5 hours and 28 minutes in length. The time of sunrise then remains practically stationary for 20 days, not more than 3 minute's difference being noted. Th rule appears to be that while the tim of sunset scarce changes from Decem ber 1 to 21, the time of sunrise ha its inning of rest from January to January 20, or just one month is

If the sun moved at the same rat or appeared so to move, each day and if the earth did not turn i northern pole away from the sun Winter and far toward the sun summer, there would be little chang

in the length of days and nights. The time which is now made us of is standard time, and it is calcu lated from the motion of an imagin ary sun moving at a regular spee tor instead of following the path the real sun to the South in Winte and back North in Summer. The named the "equation of time," which is sometimes to be added and some times to be subtracted from the tim as given by the real Sun moving wit irregular motion. This equation some times amounts to 16 minutes and the present date it is close to 6 min creasing rapidly. 
