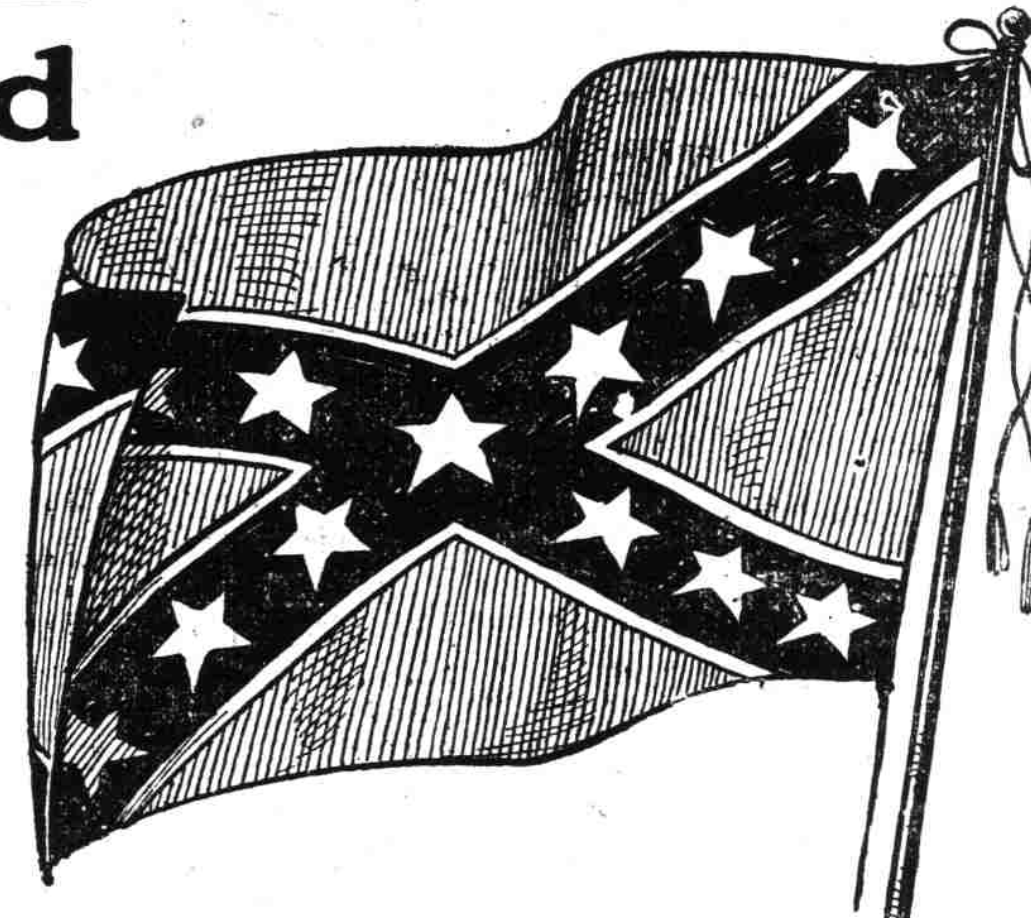
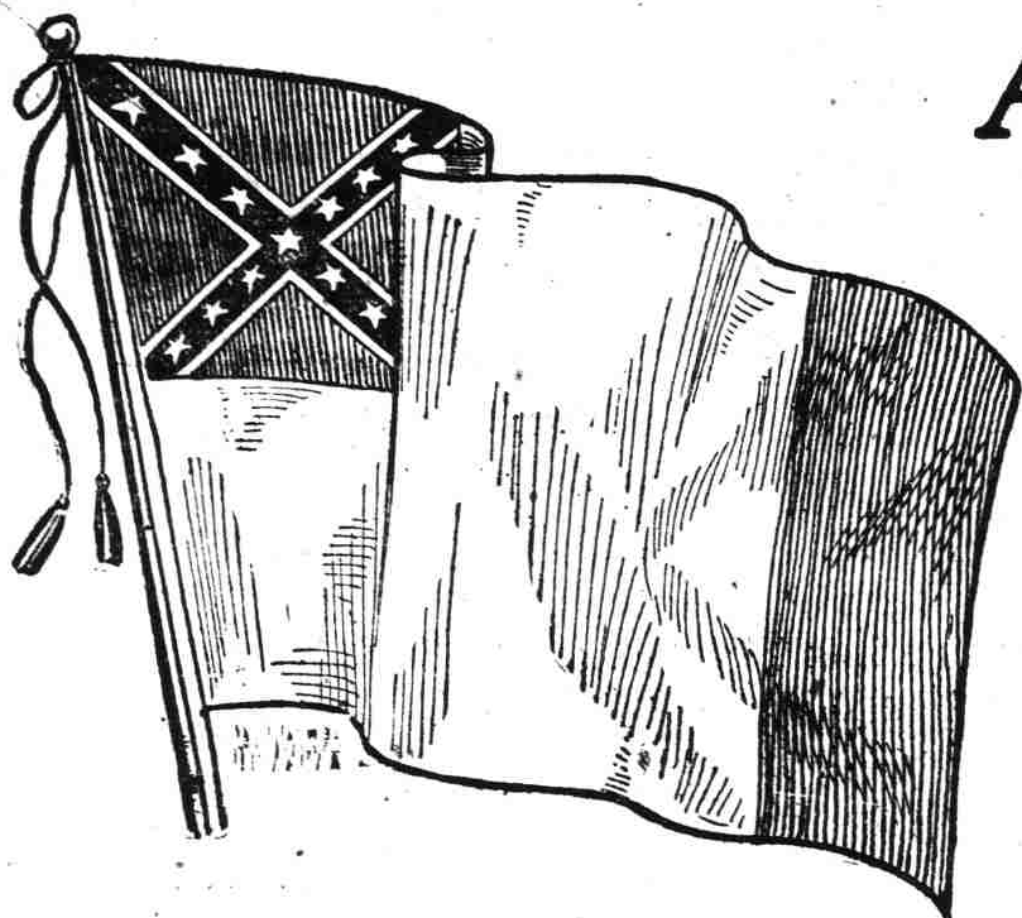

JOHNSON, ORDER INQUIRY IN PLAYERS' FIGHT.

CHICAGO, May 9.—President Johnson of the American League, last night ordered an investigation of the fist fight between players of the Boston and Cleveland clubs at Cleveland on Wednesday afternoon. He sent a message of inquiry to Umpire Connolly, who replied that he knew nothing of the occurrence except what he had read in the papers.

President Johnson then instructed the umpire to immediately ascertain the facts. At the invitation of President Connolly of the Chicago Americans, Mr. Johnson has promised to accompany the White Sox and the New York Nationals on their world tour next winter.

OLD PENN TRAINER NEAR DEATH'S DOOR.

PHILADELPHIA, May 9.—Mike Murphy, the veteran athletic trainer who has been ill for some time from a complication of diseases which physicians think was brought on by too great exertion during his athletic days, is now seriously ill with little chance of recovery.

Murphy has trained Pennsylvania athletes since the Fall of 1905 when Pennsylvania got him from Yale after Yale had taken him away from Pennsylvania. On two occasions he has been abroad with the American Olympic teams.

UMPIRE BAITING BY RALEIGH FANS

Do Not Treat Umpire and Visiting Players With Consideration.

Under the above caption The Raleigh Times tells of some incidents in the recent Charlotte-Raleigh games that did not get through in the account of the games sent here. It is to be lamented that there are such poor sports and attendants on the games in the capital as are pictured in The Times story. In all the five years of organized ball in Charlotte not one indignity has been heaped upon a visiting player, nor has the umpire had to suspend play to clear the field of spectators. There is a lot of good-natured rooting and a lot of noise made by the grandstand, but never such as pictured by The Times in the following:

"Most people who attend ball games attend for the pleasure they get out of watching the contests, others apparently attend for the chance of offering insults to the opposing players and the umpire. That was the case Tuesday afternoon. Ninety-five per cent of the crowd Tuesday was forced to hear the other five per cent rage and storm and hurl epithets at Mr. McBride. One fellow barely missed the head of a Charlotte player with a thrown bottle.

"The cause of so much boisterousness at ball games is easy to explain. From 10 to 50 sports place from 25 cents to \$1 on the result and, fearing the loss of the wager, vent their feelings on the umpire and opposing players. The small
