North Carolina To Be Well Represented At Panama-Pacific Exposition

Ashville, May 16.—George S. Powell, who went to Raleigh Monday to attend the meeting of the North Carolina Commission that has in charge arrangements for an exhibit from this state to the Panama-Pacific Exposition in San Francisco next year, later going to Norfolk for conferences with

railway officials returned to the city last night. Mr. Powell was enthusiastic over plans perfected thus far for having North Carolina represented on a magnificent scale at the world's exposition. He says that quality and concentration will be sought in the exhibit to be shown, and unless \$50,000 is raised for the purpose no exhibit will be prepared. He is confident, however, that plans launched by the commission for raising necessary funds will be successful, despite the fact that there has been no appropriation

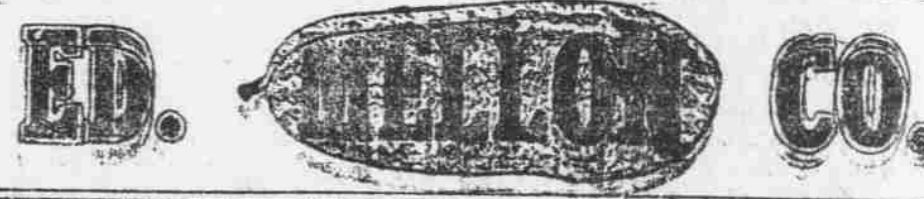
