Hornets Outclassed The Mountaineers

Hornets Ran Aay With Asheville in a Long Drawn-Out Ragged Game—Thraikill's Pitching of Shellar Variety—Game Never in Doubt.

In a long-drawn-out, uninteresting affair yesterday at Wearn Field that could hardly be termed a game the locals lambasted, ran away with, licked the Mountaineers to the tune of 7 to 3. To call the weird thing a game would be an insult to the national pastime. Asheville was simply outclassed. They never had a show. Their pitchers simply refused to let them hit. The "weird thing" dragged itself through two hours and ten minutes of slow and uninteresting "baseball" until it soon came to be a question of "How many runs will Charlotte pile up?" rather than "Who will win?" It was never in doubt.

The game as aforesaid, was a joke. But every time the fans would settle down comfortably for a quiet time the locals would add a couple of dozen hits or else the Asheville players would attempt to win the game by kick in. Rickard was benched and fined. Smith was sent in off the coaching lines for being, while the whole Asheville crew took twenty-five or more shots at the ump.

For the locals Thraikill was on the firing line and was complete master of the situation from beginning to end. Only four hits did he allow—all singles—and three of them came with two men down. The others were of the scratchiest variety. Towards the end of the game nothing but straight balls were used but even then the Mountaineers were unable to connect. He pitched masterful ball. McKeithan and Smith were on the firing line for Asheville. Fifteen hits, seven bases on balls, one hit batsman and seven runs were their contribution. The locals never failed to hit when a hit was needed. Perhaps the outstanding feature of the game happened—we use happened—in the third inning when Emery fanned with three men on bases.

To tell the scoring and just how it happened it would be easier and better to tell just when the Hornets failed to score. But this would leave practically a blank space. To tell how the scoring was done would require that each inning be given for man, for man, for man, starting things off in the first inning with a triple and from then on it was one little bingle after another. A tally was registered now and then because it was pretty hot standing on.
