MUCH IN EXCESS IS NOW PLEDGED

Reports Are That "Forward Movement" Fund of A. R. P. Church Will be Doubled

Reports from 72 out of 135 congregations of the Associate Reformers of the South indicate the pledges to the "Forward Movement" fund of that church have reached \$298,856, according to Rev. W. E. Lindsay, pastor of the First A. R. P. church, city, and secretary of the "Forward Movement."

Mr. Lindsay believes the final amount of the pledges, which are to be paid within a five-year period, will reach between \$400,000 and \$500,000, the goal being set at \$250,000 only.

JUDGE PRITCHARD PAYS WEBB HONOR

Shelby, Nov. 7. — A distinct compliment is paid Judge E. Y. Webb in a telegram which he received today from Judge Pritchard, inviting him to sit as one of the appellate judges on the circuit court of appeals beginning Monday.

He wired his resignation as congressman today to Governor Bickett, effective Monday, and has accepted Judge Pritchard's invitation, so his work as jurist will begin at Richmond.

As senior judge, Justice Pritchard has power to call either of the ten district judges in five states, and the honor is very distinct for Mr. Webb, the newest in the jurisdiction of the circuit court.

WINSTON TO HAVE FINE NEW HOTEL

The meeting was addressed by William Foor, operator of the O. Henry, and other large hotels on the Atlantic seaboard, and Architect W. L. Stoddard, of New York, who planned Greensboro's famous hotelery.
