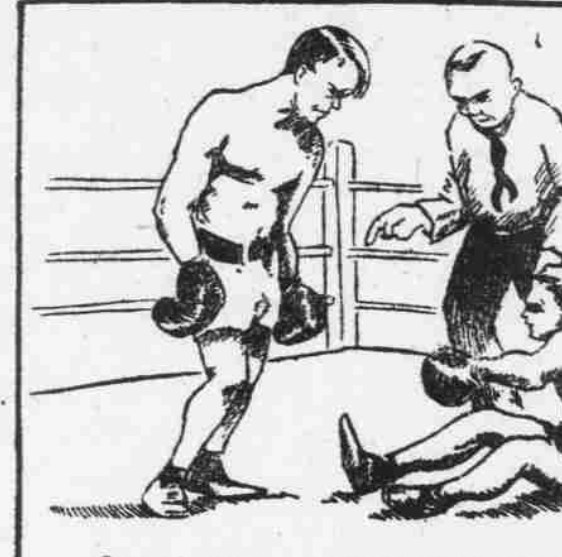

McAndrews Signed; Will Play Third Against Comers In Game Today--Manager May Pitch

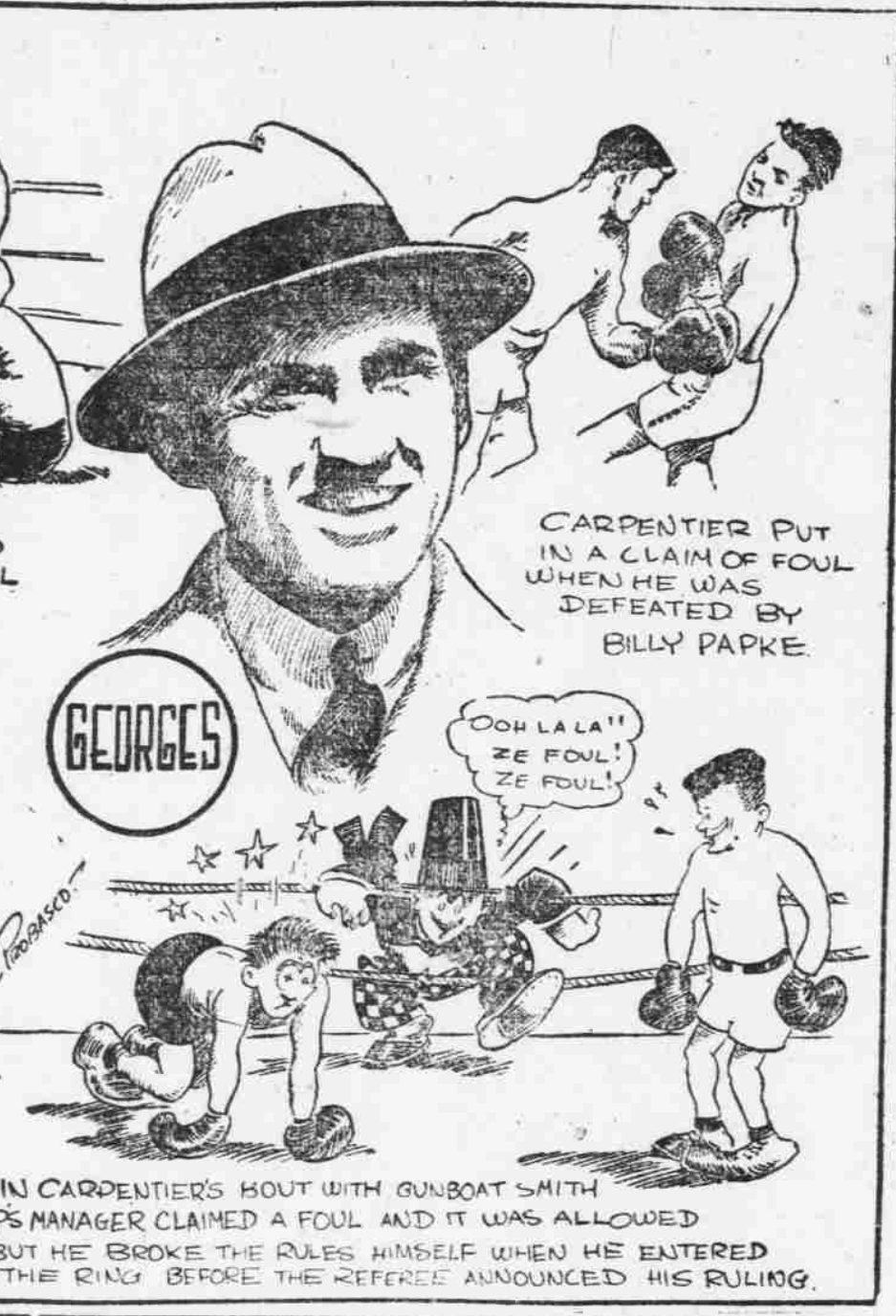
By "CASEY" CRANDALL. Charlotte opens a three day series with the champion Columbia team in Comertown this afternoon.

Mme. Lenglen Captures Tennis Championship from American.

The score was 6-2, 6-3. Mrs. Mallory, after a wonderful performance, the first part of the set, being even at two all, beat her self on errors, netting many easy shots. Both women played cautiously from the back court. Mme. Lenglen evidently feared Mrs. Mallory's shots and abandoning volleying. The ball went over the net many times. Sometimes there were more than 20 shots before points were decided. Cautions played continued throughout the second set but Mrs. Mallory consistently was less steady than the French woman.
