American Medical Association Begins Three-Day Session in the Hub City.

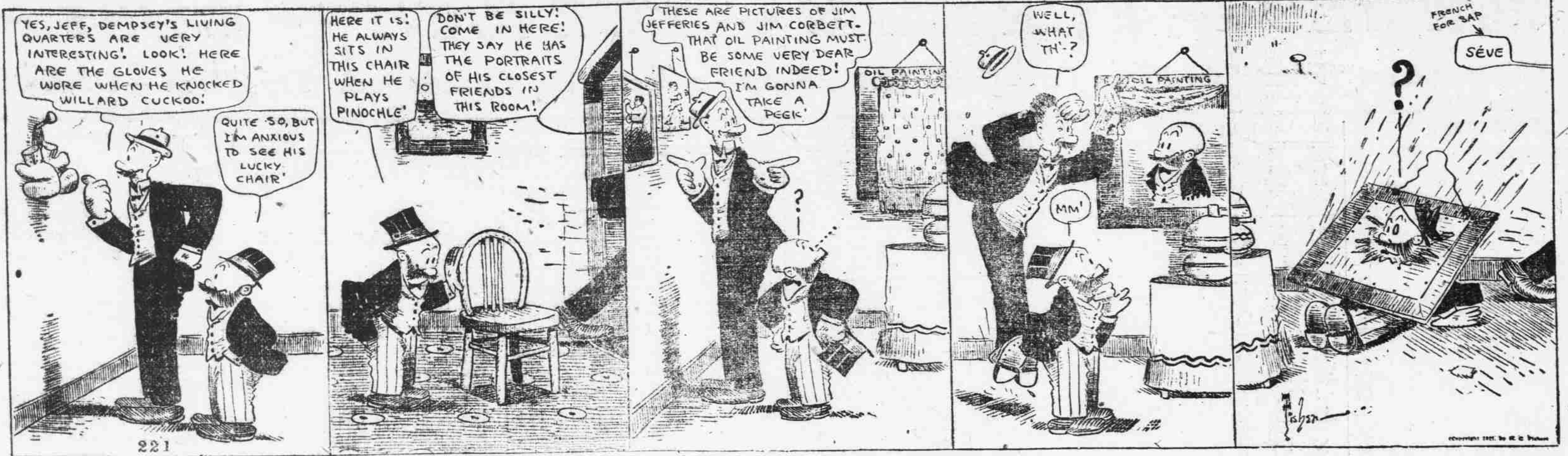
Boston, Mass., June 6.—Boston is the medical center of the United States today. The Seventy-second annual session of the American Medical Association, the national organization of the medical profession, opened here this morning.

The report of the Board of Trustees showed that, in spite of high prices and changing conditions, the Association is on sound financial basis.

MANY RECOMMENDATIONS The judicial council in its report, recommended that the board of trustees be decreased from nine to seven and that the United States be divided into seven trustee districts, trustees to be elected from each district and to serve for seven years.

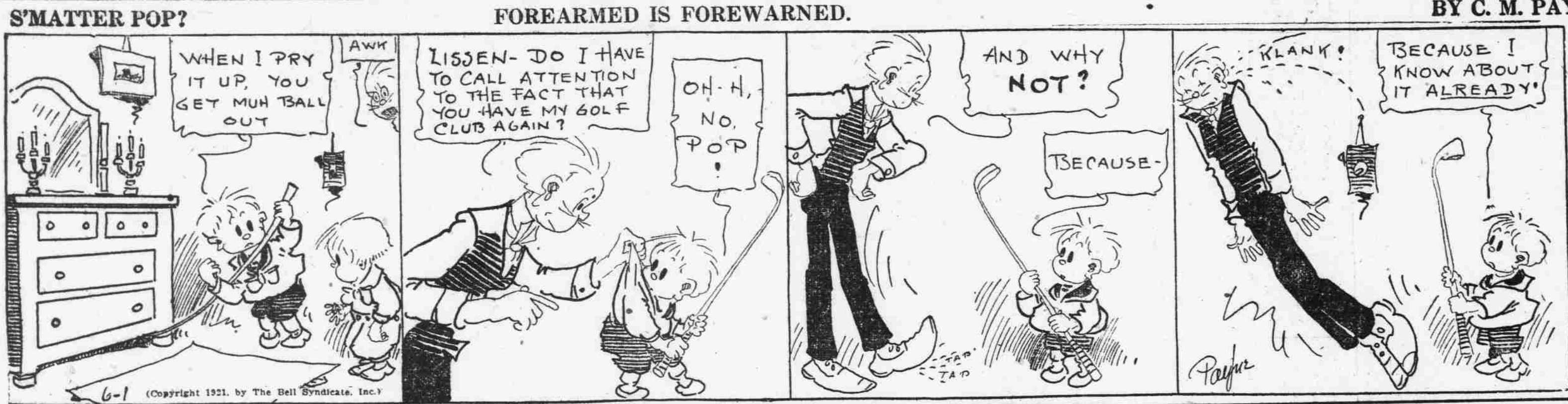
EDUCATION AND HOSPITALS The council on medical education and hospitals reported that the work undertaken in 1905 of formulating and securing uniform standards of medical education in the United States has in a large part been completed and that greater advance had been made in medical education during the past 15 years than in any other field of education in the country.
