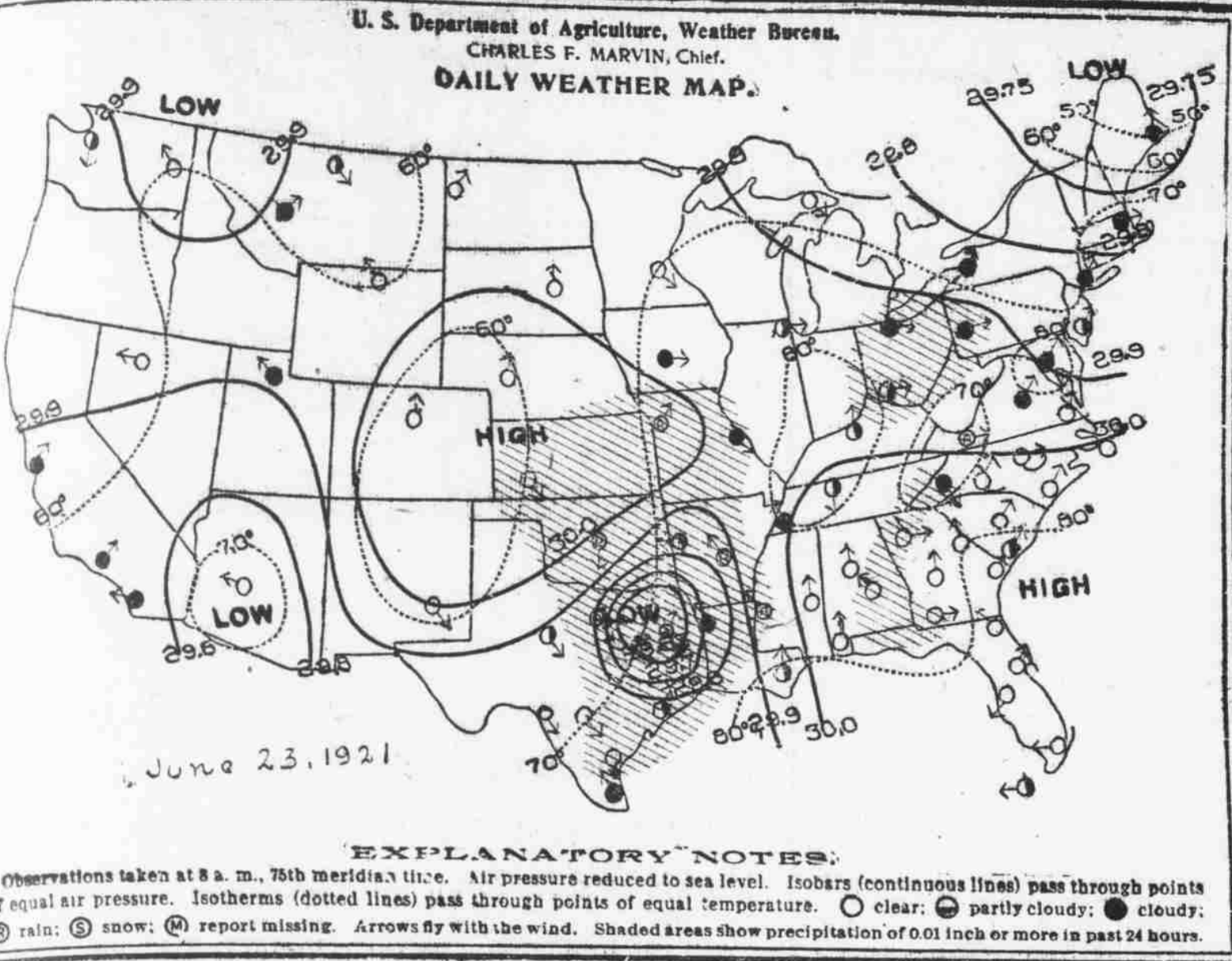

EXPLANATORY NOTES:
Observations taken at 8 a. m., 75th meridian time. Air pressure reduced to sea level. Isotherms (continuous lines) pass through points of equal air pressure. Isotherms (dotted lines) pass through points of equal temperature. Clear; ☁ partly cloudy; ☉ cloudy; ☂ rain; ☎ snow; ☁ report missing. Arrows fly with the wind. Shaded areas show precipitation of 0.01 inch or more in past 24 hours.

WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The west Gulf disturbance has moved inland to northeastern Texas, attended by general rains in the eastern third of Texas and northern and western Louisiana, and mostly light to moderate showers thence northward to northern portions of Kansas and Missouri. Gales continued yesterday on the Texas coast. Corpus Christi reporting a maximum of 40 and Galveston one of 60 miles. Houston also reports a maximum of 40 miles during the night.
There have also been light to heavy showers in the middle and upper Ohio valley and the lower lake sections, and light to moderate scattered showers in western Mississippi and northern Alabama, northern and extreme southern Georgia, and a few localities elsewhere.
Temperatures have been near the seasonal average in central and eastern and below normal in the western portion of the cotton belt.
Partly cloudy weather is indicated for this vicinity tonight, followed by unsettled on Friday, with a possibility of local showers. There will be little change in temperature.

POLES ARE KILLED IN ANTI-GERMAN RIOT
Warsaw, June 22.—Three Poles were killed and 21 wounded during anti-German demonstrations at Bromberg, a town northeast of Posen, yesterday. Seven policemen were injured during the disorder.
The trouble arose out of feeling on the part of the Poles that their countrymen who have remained at work in German factories were being ill-treated by Germans. Mayor Maciuszek, who was accused of pro-Germanism, was dragged from his office and roughly handled by Polish laborers.
