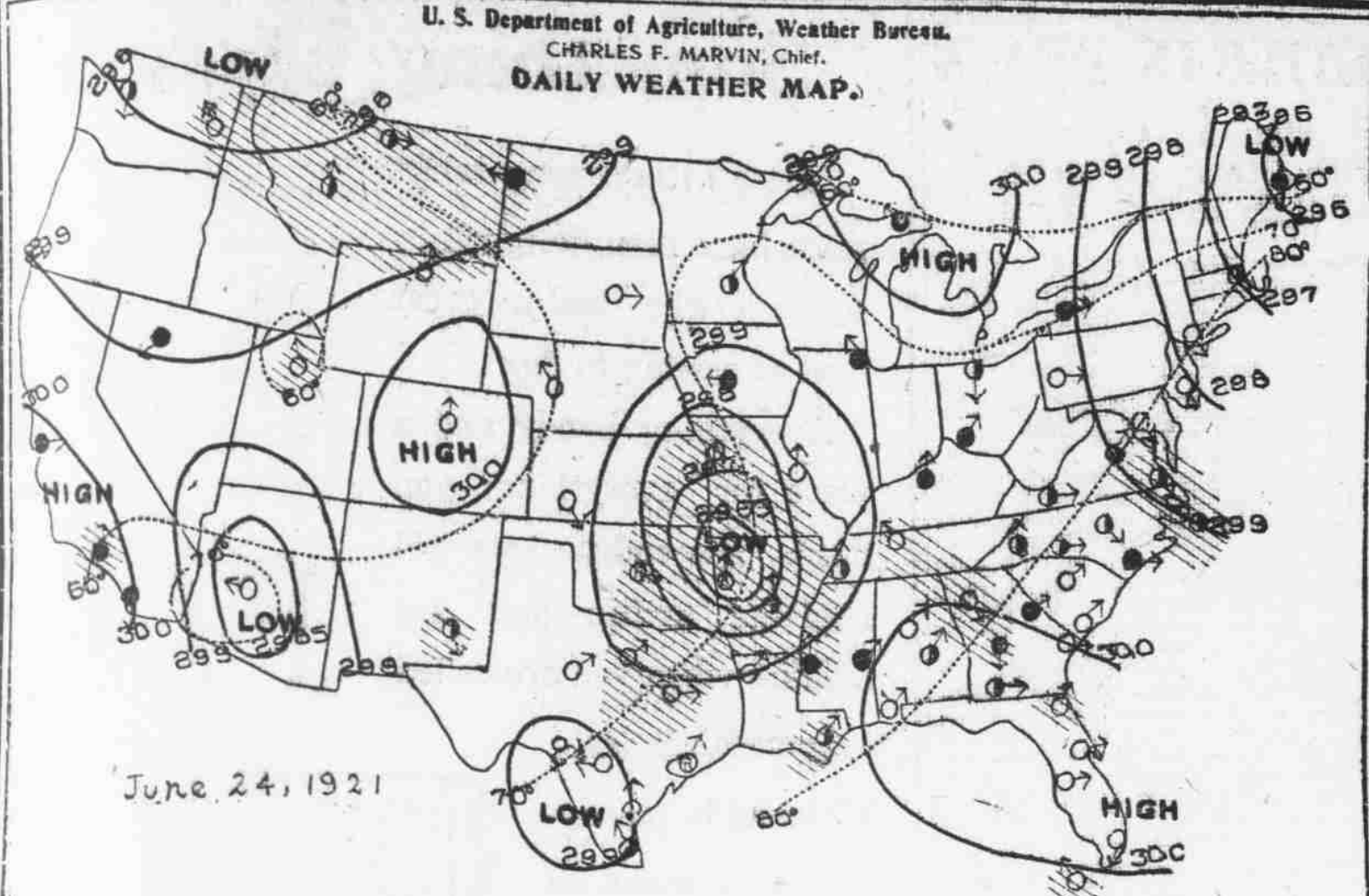

AIR MANEUVERS ARE NOT TO BE PUT OFF

Newport News, Va., June 24.—Air maneuvers at Langley Field will not be abandoned or postponed longer as a result of the tragic death of Captain Douglas and Lieutenant Plumb, killed while bombing the old San Marcus. Announcement of this effect was made today from brigade headquarters. Brigadier General Mitchell, chief of the air service, will conduct a general inspection at the flying station tomorrow and the airman will resume practice flights and tests for the bombing experiments to be conducted early in July. Airmen today are tuning up their machines in order to make a good showing tomorrow.

DEAD MAN CAN'T BE PLACED YET

Many Call to View Body, and Some Say "I've Seen Him Somewhere."

Mystery is beginning to deepen concerning the identity of the dead man who lies in the undertaking establishment of Z. A. Hovis & Company on North Tryon street. The body is that of a white man found on the Southern Railroad tracks about a half a mile beyond North Charlotte a week or so ago. Indications point to the fact that the man was killed by a passing train. He was found in the same manner, the body being identified by papers on his person as being from Spartanburg, S. C. Nothing was discovered in his pockets. He was dressed in unkempt garments. His physique was splendid, being well proportioned throughout. His hair was light ash-blond. He appeared to be about 35 years old. His hands were stained, with the juice of blackberries, indicating that he knew what it was to be hungry. But one wound was evident on his body, the top of his head being crushed in. It is believed that he and the negro fell asleep on the tracks while waiting for a chance to hobo and that a passing train struck them. WEATHER CONDITIONS.

June 24, 1921. The Gulf disturbance is central this morning over northwestern Arkansas, attended by heavy rains of one to three inches in northwestern Arkansas, eastern portions of Oklahoma and Kansas, and western Missouri. There have also been light to moderate showers in northeastern Texas and in remaining western half of the cotton belt, and scattered showers in eastern districts of the belt, with 1.50 in. locally in western Georgia. Elsewhere throughout the country little rain has fallen, except for light showers in Montana and North Dakota and a few other places. Temperatures in the cotton belt have been somewhat above normal in eastern districts and seasonably elsewhere, except for rather cool weather in the northern districts where temperatures range generally from normal to 13 degrees above normal in the northeast, 3 to 12 above normal in the middle west (except Kansas City where it is 6 below normal), and from 2 to 9 above normal in the northwest. Partly cloudy and somewhat unsettled weather will continue in this vicinity tonight and Saturday, with possibly local thundershowers. There are indications of somewhat cooler weather on Saturday.
