DUFFY LEWIS BOWS TO TIME

One of Baseball's Finest a Free Agent After Years of Service.

New York, June 25.—Baseball's great door to which there is no key on the other side has opened, and one of the greatest heroes of all time on the diamond has stepped through into the darkness. It is Duffy Lewis who passes on, leaving behind him a record as clean as the driven snow, a reputation for courage in moments of emergency that will hold its place in the register on Olympus.

Lewis has been declared a free agent by the Washington Senators after eleven years of faithful service in the American league. When this season started he was installed in left field, with Clyde Milan in right and the fleet Sam Rice in center. Duffy did not get off to a good start with the stick, but it was believed that he was just a bit backward, and George McBride kept him on the job. Finally, Lewis was put in left field, alternating with Frank Ewery, and Lewis never got back in the game except for occasional efforts in the pinch.

With half a dozen openings at his command, Duffy Lewis will not be long in finding a new team. Several enterprises in his native California await his acceptance. It is said that the Tigers and Red Sox will give him another chance if he wants it.

The rise of Lewis was meteoric. His fall was swift and sudden. In 1907 he played on the Alameda club of the California State league and was a star. The following year he was with the Oakland club of the Pacific Coast league and looked like a million dollars. In 1910 he came up to the Boston Red Sox club, and he was with the Boston club until the end of 1917. In 1918 Lewis answered his country's call, although he was married, and served in the navy.

Just the other day a group of baseball men were discussing outfielders. One of them declared that Lewis was a star the day he arrived in the big leagues, and the others, all cases having occurred at one time. That was the Speaker, now manager of the Indians, and Harry Hooper, right fielder of the Chicago White Sox. Lewis completed the greatest outfield that ever played together at one time. That was in the days of Boston's baseball glory. Lewis played on three championship clubs in the big scrimmage.

It has often been said that Lewis was without nerves and that he was with courage. Put him up to the bat with three runners on base and he would not blink an eye and watch Duffy come through. He played his first world's series in 1912 against the Giants, and did not do so much, hitting only 158. Three years later, against the Athletics, he hit 444 and was the first in sensation of the series. In 1916, against Brooklyn, he clouted 353 and showed Buck Wheat a few things about playing left field.

SPLENDORHUMOR PATHOS MINGLED

Marriage of Miss Deacon to Duke of Marlborough a Tragi-comical Affair.

Paris, June 25.—Social splendor and rowdiness, pathos and humor were curiously mingled in the making of one of the most curious marriages of the century. The Duke of Marlborough, snubbing of the bride, and the members of their own select caste. Seldom has an international marriage provided gay gossip Paris with such a wealth of picturesque incidents as did today the religious ceremony uniting Gladys Deacon, of Boston, with the Duke of Marlborough.

Outstanding in tragi-comical interest was the experience of the man who tied the knot. The Rev. T. H. Wright, pastor of the Scotch Presbyterian church, finally persuaded through weeks of ardent pleas to officiate at the ceremony. In the minutes after the last solemn "Amen," suspected as a thief with an eye on the magnificent wedding gifts.

MINISTER ARRESTED.

The tall, lean minister, who, moved by sympathy for the young bride, had waived aside his scruples with regard to the ceremony, was arrested by the duke's marrying the Boston belle, shared with the bride for a few minutes the feverish attention of the brilliant assemblage in the great High Mass room and the throne outside in the Place Lenoir, where women and men were perched on the Washington monument and other vantage points to catch a glimpse of the event.

Only a few guests were able to penetrate to the small chapel in the High Mass room; others craning their necks to hear the high, squeaky voice of the clergyman pronouncing the union by the rites of the Roman Catholic church. In the general rush of congratulations, the Rev. Mr. Wright was lost to sight. He had absent-mindedly wandered into the rooms where countless silver services and other priceless gifts were on display. He was immediately seized by three special detectives posted at strategic points to guard the presents. He had to call his duke for help.

The bridegroom smilingly explained the clergyman's identity to the ambitious sleuths and the incident was closed.

STENOGRAPHERS BATTLE.

A battle of the photographers enlivened the luncheon given in the garden after the ceremony. A French cameraman had hired three hoodlums, whose sole business it was to prevent American and English photographers from "snapping" the duke and his bride. The gangsters strictly obeyed orders, interposing themselves between the press and their quarry every time an American or English camera was about to click. Finally, the bride herself intervened in the interest of fair play at a juncture when fatigues threatened to break the union. Whereupon the Anglo-Saxons got a chance to "shoot" her and the duke.

Several persons carrying engraved invitations were seized by the gangsters, who led to further misunderstandings and hard feelings. When the rejected guests protested, the police shouldered them out.

On the other hand, many interesting incidents, including Marshal Foch, President Millerand and Premier Briand, who had been invited, sent their regrets, prompted, it was generally understood, by ingrained objections against divorce.

The bride and groom left late this afternoon on a motor honeymoon.

WILSON BECOMES ATTORNEY AT LAW

Helped by Attendants, He is Admitted by Court to Practice of Law.

Washington, June 25.—Woodrow Wilson is a living symbol of the aspirations which iron-willed championship wrecked his health. In the past few months, the world has scarcely given a thought to the silent man who retired from the turmoil of politics to a quiet part of the nation's capital, but now he is being called back for a little while to become Woodrow Wilson attorney-at-law.

In one of the big touring cars retained by the White House when he became a private citizen, a small party drove up to the east entrance of the District Supreme Court building. It was Woodrow Wilson, a gray out rug wrapped about him in his waist. With him were his former secretary Joseph Tumulty, former Secretary of State Bainbridge Colby and John Bolling, a brother-in-law.

The audience was limited to several newspaper camera-men and court attendants. The photographers had previously been ordered from the building by Chief Justice Mc Coy, who, having sighted the cameras, turned to their owners, with livid face and said: "This is damned nuisance and when a private citizen cannot do anything without being annoyed, take those things out of here."

There were no pictures and no interviews.

Helped by attendants and others, the former President emerged backward from the automobile, moving very slowly. He was dressed in formal morning coat with gray-hairing trousers and a straw hat. As he walked, or rather shuffled, he used a heavy bamboo stick with curved handle and was helped along by his attendants. His face was drawn and set, but with good color, his eyes on the ground except for an occasional upwards stare through his glasses.

HELPED INTO CAR

In the chambers he was greeted by the Chief Justice and associate justices, after which the oath was administered. He signed his first business appearance in public, all told, lasted scarcely over fifteen minutes.

WEEKS IS AFRAID OF DISARMAMENT IDEA

New York, June 25.—Secretary of War John W. Weeks recently received the honorary degree of doctor of laws at the New York University here. The former Senator from Massachusetts delivered the principal address on the same day, the occasion being the commencement exercises for the University of New York. In the course of his address the War Secretary said that it would be folly for the United States to disarm now. "It would be the height of folly for the United States unless the movement included all the nations," Weeks said. The world, he said, is not yet ready for disarmament.
