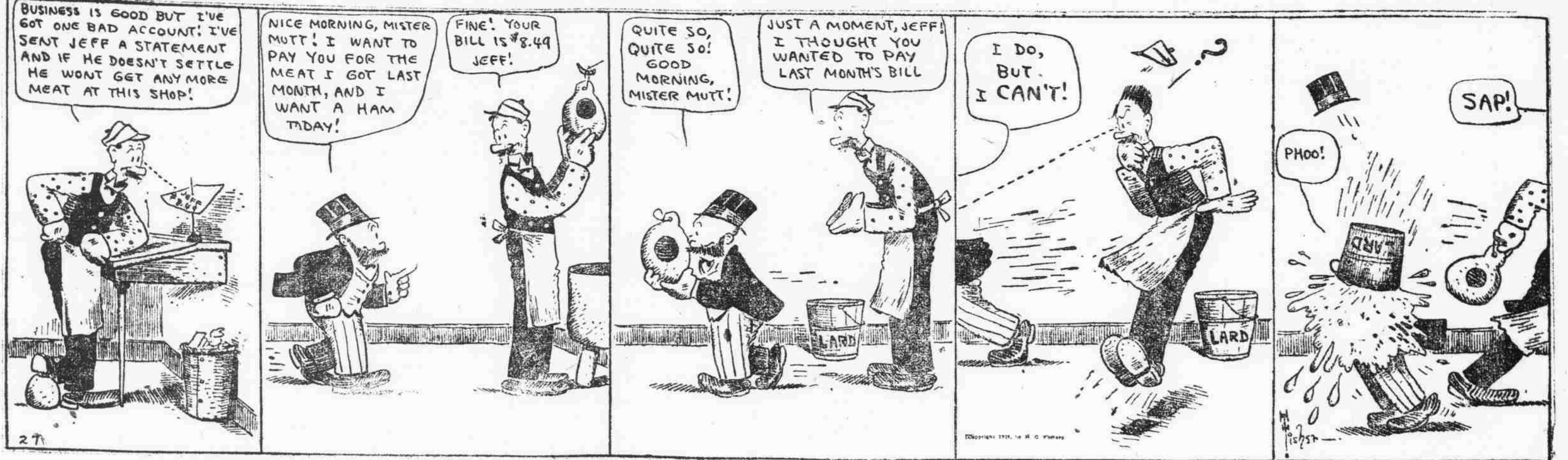

HIGH SCHOOL BOYS REPORT ON GRIDIRON

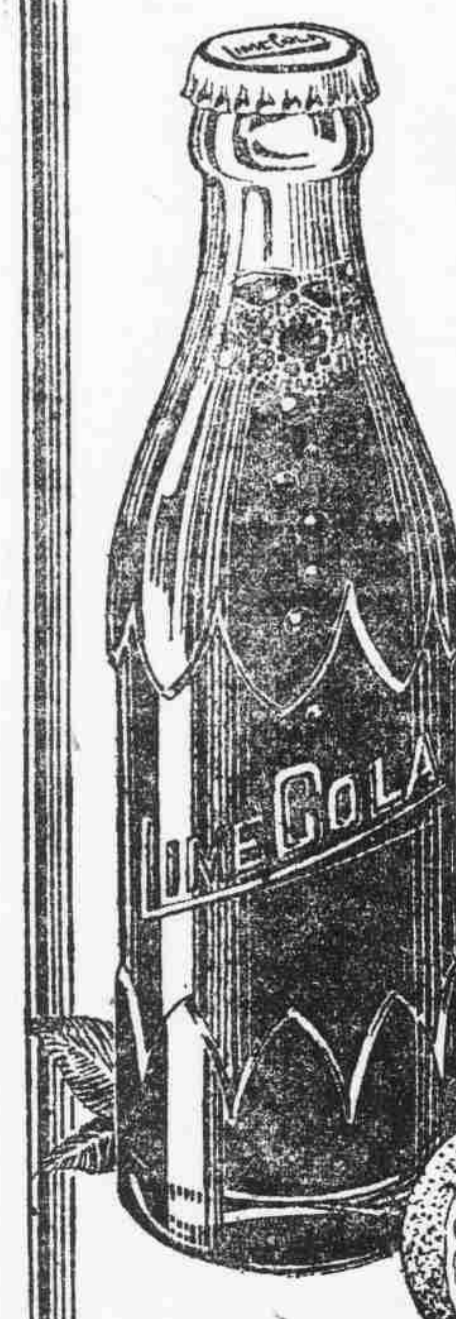
Coach Hugh Murrill, Jr., put 45 candidates for the High School football team through moderate paces Tuesday afternoon, the main effort of this first tryout being merely to get a line on the prospective players, before any actual actual is started. The condition of the weather will militate for the present, Coach Murrill stated, against strenuous exercise on the football field.
Seven men of the strong team of last year are available as a nucleus around which to build up what Coach Murrill expects to be a strong combination. Crayton, 1920 captain and Clarkson, 1921 captain, are back for service with Lowe, Walker, Woodside, Morehead and Kern also reporting. In addition there is a host of new players who will try to wrest positions on the team.

Sport Snap Shots

The mark of seven home runs in a game this season between the Philadelphia and Detroit Americans tied the officially recognized major league record for circuit drives in a single contest, but it didn't even come close to the world's record.
On July 14, 1902, Corsicana and Texarkana, in a Texas minor league, met in a regularly scheduled game which produced slugging records likely to stand for many years. Nineteen home runs, a dozen triples, ten doubles and almost a dozen singles were clouted out by the batters in this game. Corsicana won by a score of 51 to 8, and the winning team made fifty-three hits.
Incidentally, "Nig" Clark, former Tiger backstop, claims to have established in this game the world's record for home runs by an individual batsman. Clark says he drove out eight round-the-sacks hits in this game. Previous data credit Harry Wright of the Cincinnati Reds with the record of seven homers in a game in 1897.
Modern records gave the honors to Robert Lowe of Boston; Dan Brothurs of Detroit, and Ed Delehanty of Philadelphia, with four home runs apiece in one game. Seven home runs were made in game between St. Louis and Detroit, June 12, 1886. Unofficial records credit nine home runs in a game between Boston and Cincinnati in 1894.
The Philadelphia-Detroit series produced hitting that has never been rivaled in modern major league baseball, however, for the two teams made sixteen home runs in the four games.
